obstacle in the way of the best men devoting themselves to the training of youth is an hypocritical farce. In our great care for education we make the schoolmaster's life such that the forceful man, the man of energy, large heart, and large ideas, in short the man who is best suited to be a master, generally gives up school-mastering the moment he can find an opening elsewhere.

Indeed he will think it an advance to give up the making of men for the making of paragraphs. The shame is not his.
