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bacco was very acceptable, as their ftock of that article had been long expended.

As this vicinity abounded in game, many days were fpent in hunting, feafting, and preparing fuch a quantity of flefh, as might ferve them for fome time; well knowing, from experience, that a few days walk farther to the eaftward, would deprive them of the living animals.

The strangers who had left the fort, about November 1771, soon proceeded on their journey to the north-westward, except a few who had been lucky in hunting, and resolved to accompany them back to the factory, to dispose of their furs.

On the laft day of February, they refumed their journey; and foon after the Indians fell in with a party of poor inoffenfive people, whom they plundered of all they had, and even carried off fome of their young women. Thefe repeated acts of violent and unprovoked aggreffion, ferved to increase our author's indignation; and he felt very
