RESTRICTIONS ON WAR IN FRANCE

President Wilson Declares Mrs. Langford So Nervous Least Noise Would Startle Her.

New York, May 19.—To win the war the United States is determined to set no restrictions on the number of men to be sent to France, President Wilson declared here last night in a speech reaffirming the purpose of America to set no limit on the number of men who will go overseas as ships can be found to carry them.

The United States, he said, will not be diverted by insidious talk of peace proposals, he declared, springing from a desire to have a free hand in the east as well as France.

German rulers, the president declared, are mistaken if they think the United States will sacrifice anybody for their own sake.

KING TO WILSON

Thanks Him in Name of People for Assistance Already Afforded. London, May 19.—King George, in a telegram to President Wilson on the eve of the second Red Cross appeal, says: "I thank you in the name of my people for the assistance already afforded the sick and wounded in the allied countries."

HOT ARTILLERY FIGHTS NORTH OF RIVER AVRE

Paris, May 19.—The official statement issued by the war office last night reads: "There were lively artillery actions north of the river in the Champanagne sector in the region of Reims. Our patrols brought in prisoners between Launay and Noyon. Two enemy airplanes were shot down on May 18, and another during the night of May 18-19."

DILLON MANIFESTO ABSOLUTELY UNTRUE

British Paper Appeals to People of United States Not to Be Misled. London, May 19.—The Observer, commenting on the Irish situation, says: "A brave step has been taken in Ireland. For grave reasons Friday morning Prof. De Valera, president of the Sinn Fein party, and many other extremists of the same organization, were arrested."

GERMAN MORALE LESS

Amsterdam, May 19.—In commenting upon the reduction of the German bread ration from 200 to 160 grammes (5.6 ounces) daily, the socialist newspaper Vorwarts of Berlin says: "The physical and moral power of the people for resistance are visibly diminished by these new privations."
