

CHAPLAINS LIKE AIR FORCE CIRCUS, SAYS CLERGYMAN

Capt. (Rev.) C. McKinnon Addresses Anglican Synod Missionary Meeting.

TROUBLE IN INDIA

Less Than One Per Cent. Are Talking About Home Rule.

India's present political crisis was described by Rev. W. A. Earp at the Anglican synod missionary meeting at St. James' Parish Hall last night.

"There is in India," he said, "a very vociferous party, who are clamoring for what they call home rule. The request sounds reasonable, but India is not a colony."

Capt. McKinnon said that the chaplains at the front were in a sense a counterpart of the air force circus. The most impressive feature of experience at the front was the evidence of the unfolding of a new spirit of Canada in the Canadian forces.

A statement in regard to the conditions under which the men who obtain their discharge from the royal force in order to enter the C.E.F. who were of the class known as "B" and "C" were made yesterday by Toronto military headquarters. Headquarters stated that such men can volunteer in any category. A former combatant branch of the C. E. F. service which is open to receive recruits, but there is no combatant unit open to recruiting except the infantry battalions, where they would be gladly welcomed and where they were seriously needed. In regard to this matter the registrar stated yesterday that any men who were of the class "B" or "C" after receiving discharges from the C. E. F. would at once come under the act and be treated as regular draftees.

DRAFTEES TAKE DRUGS TO DECEIVE MILITARY

Unusual precautions are being taken by the office of the Ontario registrar to prevent deception by the men who are called upon to appear before the medical boards. This applies to both before and after the men have been ordered to report for military service. In this connection the incident is related of a Hamilton bank clerk who was examined five times by the army doctors and on each occasion put in a medical category lower than the Dominion police had an intimation that the man was, by the taking of drugs, controlling his category, and it was arranged that he was to have a week's detention. Following the detention a medical examination proved he was an A2 man.

Those composing the draft were mostly men who had been called up under the M.S.A. for service with the depots, infantry battalions and later transferred to the Engineers in account of possessing special qualifications.

It will be the first event of the kind in which the drafted men in this military district have taken part. There will be a two-hour halt by the troops at Queenston before they commence their march back to Niagara Camp. The headquarters staff officers will go from Toronto to Niagara to witness the troops field day.

A military order issued yesterday afternoon states that the bars of the Cadillac and the Lennon hotels, in Toronto, remain out of bounds to all troops, but that the balance of each building is now placed within bounds.
