**STUDENTS IN PEDAGOGY**  
TO VISIT IN SCHOOLS

Agreement to Be Entered Into Between University and Board of Education.

An agreement was endorsed by the management committee of the board of education yesterday, whereby, if the board of governors of Toronto University pay over \$4000 in half-yearly instalments, the university students in the faculty of education will be permitted to visit the various schools for the purpose of studying the teaching process. In this manner, the aspirants to the teaching profession will be enabled to master the theoretical and practical sides during the period of graduation. The agreement embodies only the faculty of education of the university, and only in so far as concerns observation and practice-teaching, subject to such conditions as to details as may be agreed upon from time to time by the chairman of the board of education, the chief inspector of public schools, the senior principal of high schools representing the board of education, and the dean of the faculty of education representing the board of governors. In case of disagreement the superintendent of education may be appealed to, whose decision shall be final.

In view of the appointment of Mr. Eldon to the principalship of the technical school, the following promotions in the teaching staff were made: Wm. Ward, B.A., assistant commercial master, to head of the commercial department; W. G. Edwards of Cobourg, appointed assistant commercial master; W. H. Macpherson, specialist in English and French, to the head of the department of languages and history. This latter work was heretofore taken by Dr. Pakenham.

The following "first-class" teachers were appointed to the temporary staff: Harold B. Wood, to Dewson-street School; D. M. Davidson, to Jesse Ketchum School; Mr. Davidson, to Palmerston School; and the following transfers were made: Mr. Riddick, from Dovercourt to Jesse Ketchum, and Mr. Kirk, from the Victoria Industrial School to Dovercourt School.

Two teachers, whose terms have been interrupted since their original engagements, were given credit with terms of service dating back to their first appointments, and will be scheduled accordingly. They are: Capt. J. S. Brown, appointed to Dufferin School in 1888, resigned in 1892, and re-appointed in February, 1905; and Mrs. Dandy (nee Parker), resigned 1901 and re-appointed in September, 1905.

**NEW SCHOOL ON MANNING AV.**  
Trustee Leves will try and get a sufficient appropriation.

Manning-avenue school may be replaced this year by a "first-class" building. When the board of education meets Thursday night, Trustee Leves will move that it be an instruction to the property and finance committees to place a sufficient amount in this year's estimates to provide a new school building on the Manning-avenue site, as possible.

The present building is pretty well crowded and bids fair to become more so, especially since the members of the board are talking of doing away with one of the schools in the southwestern part of the city. Then, again, the school is much dilapidated and inadequate to modern requirements.
