MYSTERIES OF RED TAPE.

East Toronto Paper Hit Hard by P. O. Regulations.

The East Toronto Standard has been informed by Assistant Postmaster Lemon that owing to letter carrier delivery having been established in East Toronto, Coleman, Norway, Tordmorden, Doncaster, West Toronto Junction, Davenport and Carlton West, districts, copies of The Standard sent out for delivery in these districts will hereafter be liable to postage at the rate of 1c per four ounces to each separate address, to be prepaid by post-age stamps.

This, says The Standard, is one of the benefits of free rural delivery. The places mentioned are just outside the city limits, while the paper goes free to Weston or Markham, and for the cost of sending one copy to Coleman 40 copies can be sent to Dunbar, B.C. The Standard comments:

"The machine at Ottawa moves so extra mysteriously that it blindly plants the hind feet on struggling journalism so that a copy of The Standard mailed to a subscriber in Norway, at our very doors, must be the ruling of the gods, ride first to the Toronto Postoffice, then by train to Dunbar, then on the Grand Trunk, then by stage to Norway—a trip of some 45 miles to reach a subscriber half a mile away!"

Bank Clearings.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—The following are the weekly bank clearings, as compiled by the Federal Reserve Board, showing percentage of increase and decrease, as compared with the corresponding week last year:

The Home Bank of Canada.

A dividend at the rate of 6 per cent. annum upon the paid-up capital stock of the Home Bank of Canada has been declared for the half-year, ending Nov. 30. This is the fourth dividend paid by the Home Bank of Canada and approximately the one-third and eighth paid by the institutions out of which the Home Bank has grown. The Toronto Savings Bank, organized in 1854, was the pioneer of the present Home Bank. In 1872 the Home Savings & Loan Company took over the assets of the Toronto Savings Bank, and in 1906 the Home Bank of Canada took over the assets of the Home Savings & Loan, whose business was finally wound up last January with the payment of a 30 per cent. dividend. The president, Eugene O'Keefe, and the general manager of the Home Bank of Canada, Lieut.-Col. James Mason, filled the same offices in the Savings & Loan Company, and both began their banking careers with the Toronto Savings Bank.

EMPRESS OF CHINA FLEET.

First Mishap in Seventeen Years, Says Captain Archibald.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Oct. 25.—The Empress of China is practically afloat, and to-day an army of men are trying to make a new record of the most rapid overhauling an ocean liner ever received, with the object of enabling the vessel to sail for the Orient in time to deliver British mails, so avoiding the penalty.

Capt. Archibald, who has sailed the Empress of China for 17 years, says this is her first mishap. It is probable the vessel will sail Thursday, two days late, which is to be made up in passage. The upper works of the vessel were never below water, as the clearing of the fog revealed the morning, and the vessel was saved from going on her side by lighter craft and cables. One of the lashings from the mainmast to the whale broke, striking Quartermaster Rose, breaking his leg.
