All Confess That It Was the Best Yet Held in the Good Diocese of Toronto.

THE RESULTS OF THE BALLOTING.

Good Report of the Doings of the Girls' Auxiliary—Bishop's Reception Last Night.

The 13th annual meeting of the Women's Auxiliary to Missions of the Diocese of Toronto was brought to a close last evening. The attendance for the three days has been above the average, and the proceedings characterized by earnestness and a deep spirituality. Able papers were read, and the auxiliary is doing, it is but a drop in the bucket compared to the need, and no regret was expressed that urgent claims cannot be met for want of funds.

Programs of Interest. Yesterday morning there was a conference of the junior branches, and many helpful suggestions were made as regards concerted work among the churches. In the afternoon the principal subject of discussion was the practical one of "Systematic Giving." This was ably treated by Miss Mabel Cartwright, and was followed by a helpful discussion. The offering as a matter of course were now in order, and as they were numerous and satisfactory this was gratefully acknowledged by the singing of the Doxology.

VERY LIKE ANOTHER BLUFF. A Washington (?) Correspondent Sends a Threatening Despatch to The Detroit Free Press.

Detroit, April 28.—A Washington special to The Free Press says: The Treasury Department is preparing to act in the matter of taking retaliatory measures to offset the course of the Government of Ontario in prohibiting the exportation of log cut from Crown lands purchased by American citizens prior to the enactment of the statute requiring the products of Canadian stumpage to be manufactured within the Dominion.

Secretary Gage has telegraphed to Senator Fairbanks, chairman of the American contingent of the Joint High Commission, requesting him to come to Washington for an early conference with regard to the subject of lowering the provision in the Dingley Act. Mr. Fairbanks will arrive here early next week, when an important conference will follow. Secretary Gage has advanced the proposition to impose a duty of \$4 per thousand upon lumber, but to give notice that such duty is not to take effect until after the expiration of the present tariff.

Richmond Hill. The Metropolitan Railway are rushing along their extension at the rate of half a mile a day, and no time will be lost in having the through run to Newmarket open at the earliest possible date. 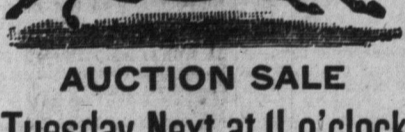
