HEINZMAN IS GONE

One of Toronto's Oldest and Most Respected Citizens Passed Away Yesterday Morning at His Residence, "The Birches," Toronto Junction.

The death of Mr. Theodore August Heinzman, Toronto, has lost one of her oldest and most respected citizens. Full of years and honors the venerable head of the firm of Heinzman & Co. passed peacefully away yesterday morning at his residence, "The Birches," West Annet-street, Toronto Junction.

Mr. Heinzman was born in Berlin, Germany, May 13, 1817, and was consequently in his 82nd year. At the age of 14 he was apprenticed to learn the trade of piano maker, his master being his brother, Charles Heinzman. He thus became a pianist in the business of which he was in later years one of the most successful.

Arrival in Toronto. In 1850 Mr. Heinzman severed his connection with the Buffalo firm and came to Toronto, where the fame of the firm and his own reputation preceded him.

On His Eightieth Birthday. On May 13, 1897, the Birches at the Junction was the scene of a festive gathering to celebrate the eightieth birthday of Mr. Heinzman.
