LEGAL DECISIONS

At Osgoode Hall, on Monday, the London mayoralty election case again came before the divisional court. Mr. W. H. Bartram, the complainant, in person, appealed from order of Judge Ferguson, refusing a mandamus to E. J. Parke, the police magistrate for the city of London, to take the information of the complainant charging subornation of perjury against the so-licitor for the city of London. The complainant alleges that the solicitor

procured the defendant in the action of Sims vs. Kingston to swear an affidavit on production of documents which was not true. Hellmuth (London) for the magistrate, contra. Appeal dismissed without costs, on the ground that the sole method of proceeding was that provided by the act to protect justices of the peace from vexatious actions, R. S. O., chap. 88.

In the same court, in Tourangeau vs. the Township of Sandwich South, F. E. Hodgins, for plaintiff, appealed from judgment of the seventh division court in the county of Essex, in an action upon a written order directed to the defendants and signed by one Halford, and requested the corpora-tion to pay one Ferry \$160 for work done on the Colchester townline drain. Ferry indorsed the order to plaintiff, to whom he was indebted. The court below held the order invalid, because not signed by the commissioner appointed to examine the work. A. H. Clarke (Windsor), for defendants, opposed appeal. Dismissed with costs. Judgments in the two Chatham cases were handed out by Judge Rose. Re Wilson and City of Chatham. Judgment on motion to quash bylaw of the under 669, and no resolution under 677, the bylaw was invalid. Order quashing bylaw with costs. Order to be restricted to persons moving against the bylaw. BICYCLE TRUST

Majority of Manufacturers Said To Be Ready to Go In.

Toronto, April 12.—A number of bicy-cle manufacturers had a conference yesterday with Mr. Jaffray, of Chicago, who is promoting the formation of a trust of the various bicycle makers in Canada. It is understood that a ma-jority of the manufacturers are willing to go in, provided the terms are favorable, and the obstacles which stand in the way can be removed. One of these is the fact that the Cleveland Bicycle Company has not consented yet to go into the amalgamation, and another is that 50 per cent of the wheels sold are imported from the United States.

From what can be learned the plan is to combine the factories, with a capital stock of \$3,500,000. Of this sum \$1,-500,000 is offered to the public, those who purchase stock to get 7 per cent for their investment. With the money thus raised the companies are to be paid for their plant and factory, but not for the goodwill of their trade. The value of that will be given them in stock in the remaining \$2,000,000, to bear interest at 7 per cent. The object, it is said, is not to crush out the smaller concerns, nor to advance prices, but rather to make an effort to keep out the cheaper grade of wheels brought into Ontario and sold here.

Last season it was estimated that more imported wheels were sold than wheels manufactured in Canada. It is to double the output of the domestic manufacturers. The meeting was a fairly representative one, it was stated, but the names of those present were not given. Those present favored the scheme. It was decided, however, to postpone organization in order that some other firms might be represented. The names of the firms in the trust projected are kept in secret by those engineering the scheme.

"If this scheme goes through," said a manufacturer, "it will not have the effect of raising the price of wheels, but of cheapening them. They can be produced more cheaply and placed upon the market at a smaller cost. The first result will be to throw some 50 travelers out of situations, and it may deal a heavy blow at the assembler and mid-

There has been more or less precipitation all through the month, but this has not benefited wheat much, as the snow was either blown away or melted nearly as soon as it fell. There has been much freezing and thawing, especially during the first half of the month. This has caused many fields to be covered with water, or partly so at least, which was unable to settle away, as the ground was frozen to a great depth.


