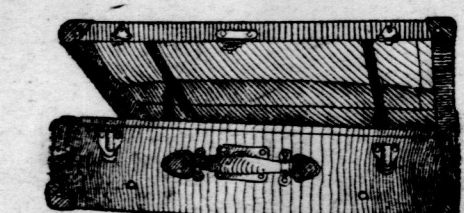

GRAB BUFFALO THEATER

Klaw and Erlanger's Men Use Revol-
vers to Eject John Laughlin.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 26.—Representa-
tives of Klaw and Erlanger and the
Shuberts took forcible possession of
the Lyric Theater here Sunday morn-
ing after a fight in which it is said
revolvers were flourished, and John
Laughlin, who for ten years has been
fighting what is known as the "The-
atrical Trust" was forcibly ejected from
the playhouse.

After ejecting Laughlin and the at-
tendants, the doors were barricaded,
locks changed and a guard placed at
all the entrances.

The invaders claim they have signed
contracts from Mr. Laughlin which
gives them lawful possession of the
place for the next eight years. Mr.
Laughlin avers that the terms of the
contracts have not been fulfilled by
Klaw and Erlanger and the Shuberts,
and says he will fight in the courts for
possession of his theater.

ADVERTISER ACCOUNT

WAS CORRECT

Statements Credited to Capt. Midford
Were Made by Him to Reporter.

The statement credited to Capt.
Midford, in the Free Press, that The
Advertiser deliberately misquoted him
in his interview for spring water, is
absolutely without foundation. Capt.
Midford said that there was plenty of
water at Springbank to supply half a
dozen cities the size of London, and
that the city would be foolish to adopt
a filtration scheme when such was the
case.

The statement was heard by several
witnesses, who declare that The Ad-
vertiser account of the interview is ab-
solutely correct. Capt. Midford was
not in the city today when a reporter
sought him.

FIRST NIGHT AUDIENCES

They Are Composed of Certain Classes
of People Only.

New York, Aug. 26.—Three New
York theaters opened their doors
Saturday for the regular season. On
Monday two more opened, on Thurs-
day one and on Monday of next week
five. So this is the busy season for
the regular first-nighters. They seem
to think that the fate of every pro-
duction rests with their judgment,
but as a matter of fact managers put
no faith in their opinion.

In the first night audience in
New York one sees a lawyer who has
distinguished himself in the divorce
court and has come out of it with
only one indictment against him;
a big loudly dressed man who has
escaped for a few hours from the
wearing duties of managing a
gambling house to further the in-
terests of the theater; young mil-
lionaires who have spent the after-
noon at the race tracks—of that
class which offhandedly offers a
million dollars' bail every time his
chauffeur is arrested for speeding;
dressmakers—beg pardon, modistes
—who have succeeded in business
and are devoting their leisure to art;
wigmakers and corset makers, wine
agents, and proprietors of all-night
restaurants. They suggest late break-
fasts in bed, many hours before mir-
rors, and an activity only equal to
the period when electric lights glisten
along Broadway.

WHY APPENDIX CUTS UP

British Doctor Says Steel Roller Flour
Causes Trouble.

London, Aug. 25.—W. H. Battle,
F. R. C. S., in a remarkable lecture
delivered at St. Thomas Hospital, de-
clared his belief that the spread of
appendicitis was due to the worldwide
use of steel roller flour. The sugges-
tion, coming from the suggestionist,
regarding this statement the Lan-
cet says: "We are inclined to think
there may be good foundation for Bat-
tle's theory."

Battle maintains that there has been
a real increase in the frequency of
appendicitis, and that the older phy-
sicians did not have so many cases as
we see now. It was not merely the
want of observation, for they were
careful observers, and if the condition
had been even half as frequent as at
present they would have observed it.

Sir Samuel Fenwick found only
nineteen cases of a diseased appendix
in the post-mortem records of the
London hospital in the period of forty
years which ended in 1884.

Several theories have been suggest-
ed to account for the enormous in-
crease which has occurred, and after
discussing the cause of the suggestionist,
Battle brings forth the idea that mi-
nute particles of iron are the real cause.

He shows that the great increase in
appendicitis first occurred at the time
when steel or iron rollers were intro-
duced for the grinding of flour. The
increase of the disease occurred first
in
