No hint was received of their findings until the meeting of the board of works on Tuesday night, when they simply tossed a bomb shell into the whole works. It came as a bolt from the blue, and it was effective.

According to estimates at the city hall it will require about \$20,000 to put the machinery in good condition again. This will mean that the interior of the incinerator will have to be replaced. Repairs can be made at a heavy expense, no estimate of that being available, but this would be only a temporary makeshift, and probably a most expensive one. Some repairs will have to be made at once to keep the plant in operation.

Commission Named To Investigate the Newsprint Business Report Serious Situation and Ask For Emergency Legislation Giving Government Control of Importation

WITH CANADIAN CO-OPERATION

Ottawa, June 13.—It is improbable that, pending the report of Com missioner Pringle on the newsprint paper situation in Canada, there will be any action on the suggestion of the United States Federal Trade Com-mission that Canada should establish a Government agency for the distribution of paper and control of prices to publishers. The matter has not yet come to the attention of the Government, officially. A high authority here states that a Canadian pool is already in practical existence. Manufacturers who are supplying the burn of the Canadian trade at the fixed price of \$2.50, are compensated by the other manufacturers for the difference between that price and the \$3.25 figure at which the latter are selling elsewhere.

Washington, June 13.—Pooling of newsprint paper production and importation under a Government agency for distribution to publishers at a price providing a fair profit to manufacturers was recommended today by the Federal Trade Commission in a report on its investigation of the industry conducted during the last year. The commission is so suggested that the Government seek to induce Canadian authorities to establish a similar agency to co-operate with the American pool.

In a letter transmitting the report to the Senate, which ordered the investigation, the commission asked emergency legislation to make the recommendations effective. It declared that if the 1816 consumption of 1,775,000 tons of print paper is equaled this year, the cost to consumers will be \$105,000,000, an increase of \$35,000,000 or 50 per cent over 1916, and that one-half of this increase represents additional profits to manufacturers.

The voluntary agreement arranged with manufacturers several months ago for distribution of paper to publishers at moderate prices was abandoned, the commission reported, and the plan failed because no Government authority for enforcement existed. The situation is serious and likely to reach a panic state in a few months because of lack of sufficient competition among producers, said the commission.
