

ASHES WILL BURN; NO DOUBT OF IT

Experiments Now Being Conducted in London—Successful in Toronto.

All consumers of coal in the city are intensely interested in the new formula for saving fuel. They will also be interested in knowing that a series of experiments have been started by a well-known London manufacturer to prove the value of it. The Globe says: "The day of heavy coal bills is passing—has passed, in fact. It has been successfully demonstrated that ashes will burn, and the secret of it is every man's. Moisture with either salt water or salt water containing caustic soda solution, a mixture consisting of one part coal and three parts ashes, placed in your furnace or in the kitchen range, and as you shut the door you will have visions—visions that are of true prophecy—of your coal bill shrinking, losing its ciphers, and in the end, if you save up enough ashes, washing the kettle on the range will send a new song with martial vigor, while the heat waves from your radiators will zig-zag upward in never-ending procession. It is true, this statement that ashes will burn. The people of Toronto doubt no longer. They have tried it, many of them, and there begins already to haunt the malevolent minds the picture of a lean, gaunt, hollow-eyed figure shrinking in his clothes—the coal dealer trying to get a corner on the ashes market.

A test was made yesterday by the day engineer of the Toronto Globe, Charles Kinsey. "Four bushels of ashes which were ready for hoisting to the garbage wagons were emptied on the floor. About 24 pounds of coal were piled on top of that, and the mixture was burned thoroughly. Two handfuls of salt were borrowed from a nearby grocery and this was dissolved in a pail of water. The ashes and coal were damped with the brine, and the new fuel was ready.

"Still convinced that the papers were telling untruths when the statement was made that ashes would burn, the engineer shoveled the mixture into the furnaces. He and his assistant sat down where they could watch the steam gauges. Pretty soon the hand on the gauge began to move. Then by degrees it went around to higher figures than Charlie had ever seen it before.

"When seen three hours later Mr. Kinsey stated that he had added no more fuel, whereas on other days he had to throw in more coal every hour. No mathematical calculations had been used in measuring the mixture, neither had they added any caustic soda.

"This discovery that coal may be made perfectly combustible is a serious thing. For many years the British Admiralty has conducted experiments which show that coal immersed for long periods of time in the ocean burns better and leaves less residue. The chemical explanations of this phenomenon are without doubt analogous. The coal, who for long years has striven to solve the problem, and who succeeded at last, might have become a millionaire, but some one opened the bag and the cat is out. All the world burns ashes now—or soon will."

PHYSICIANS AGAINST RIVER WATER

The Medical Men's Views.
Dr. Beecher favors artesian wells, but failing that he would go to Komoka for water.

Dr. Belton wants spring water for drinking purposes. He would be in favor of establishing a river water scheme for fire fighting purposes.

Dr. Burdon comes out flat-footed for river water. He thinks that it would be, if properly filtered, the superior of the present supply, as it would not contain so much lime, which is hard on the system.

Dr. Campbell prefers filtered river water to the present supply.

Dr. Clive wants spring water, if it is possible to get it.

Dr. Cowan favors river water, properly filtered, and he sees no reason why water from the north branch cannot be properly filtered.

Dr. Ferguson is for spring water properly collected and stored.

Dr. Hogg is in favor of spring water, but he is afraid the city will find it a difficult problem to secure an adequate supply.

Dr. Toddall wants spring water if it is possible for the city of London to get it.

Dr. MacLaren stands out for spring water. He points out that it would be impossible to keep the water from the north branch clear of the most violent contamination, owing to the low banks and the fact that there are numerous towns along the river which empty their sewage into it. He admits that there is something in the cry that there is too much lime in the present water supply, and that it is hard on the digestive organs, but the doctor declares there is nothing in the water which will shorten life. He would greatly prefer the prevalence of typhoid if filtered river water was adopted as a drinking supply.

Dr. Meek prefers river water to the present supply because of the presence of lime in the water.

Dr. Morgan is also in favor of river water. He thinks such water properly filtered would be found to be equal as pure as spring water.

Does Not Want Komoka Water.
Dr. Niven wants spring water under the circumstances, but he is in favor of going to Lake Huron for a supply if

the city could afford it. He says he does not want spring water from Komoka, however.

Dr. Thomson thinks filtered water from a stream having a proper flow would be all right, but he does not favor water from the north branch, as the flow of water is very small in the hot weather, and it would be very hard to cleanse it of impurities. Under the circumstances, he is against the river water scheme.

Dr. Waugh is for spring water, as pure as our present supply.

Dr. John D. Wilson, Dr. Jas. D. Wilson and Dr. George D. Wilson want nothing to do with river water for any purpose.

Dr. Wishart is opposed to river water so long as it is possible to secure a supply from any other source.

Dr. English, chairman of the local board of health, said he favored river water. He declared that it is only a question of time until it will be necessary to filter the present springbank supply, owing to the fact that it is annually becoming harder to keep it free from contamination. If the city could afford it, he would say go to the lake for a supply.

Dr. Seaborn is for spring water in preference to any other supply.

It was found impossible to interview several other prominent physicians, whose opinions would have been of much interest.

A SERIOUS CHARGE

Sewing Machine Agent Pabst of This City Placed Under Arrest.

CUTTING OFF COW'S TAIL

Serious Charge Against Stratford Man—Detective Rider Got Him.

Yesterday afternoon Detective Rider arrested Guiliano De Petrillo De Plucido at one of the boarding-cars on the G. T. R. at Eglinton street, at the request of Chief McCarthy, of Stratford, on a charge of maiming a cow, by cutting her tail off.

All that Detective Rider had to work upon was a description of Guiliano, which was telephoned to him by Chief McCarthy, but after making a tour of inspection through the different cars, he finally located his man.

Guiliano De Petrillo De Plucido, who is about 30 years of age, offered no resistance, but after his arrest, the detective found on him a large knife, with which he could easily have made himself a dangerous person. Guiliano was taken to the police station in the patrol wagon, and was taken back to Stratford by Chief of Police McCarthy, who came here at 10:40 this morning.

Frank Russo, of Stratford, is the owner of the cow off which, it is alleged, Guiliano De Petrillo De Plucido cut the tail. Russo had been away for several days, and upon returning, found that his cow was minus its tail.

TO DO DOUBLE DUTY

Factory Inspectors Will Also Examine the Stationary Engineers.

Toronto, April 18.—It is understood that the three new factory inspectors to be appointed by the Ontario Government will also constitute the board of examiners for stationary engineers, provided for in the bill just passed. By appointing factory inspectors qualified to act as examiners, the department will avoid duplication and save expense, and it is claimed the scheme will work very satisfactorily. It is understood Robert Hungerford, a well-known labor man of Toronto, will be chosen for one of the new positions, although no official announcement has been made as yet.

A. thinks that his boys will trim the local champion up in easy fashion, but Amos, while realizing that he is up against a good hard game, feels confident that he can repeat his performance of a week ago, when he met and defeated three good local runners in a similar event.

—But one case has been set down for the weekly sitting of the high court for London, tomorrow, before Mr. Justice Clute. It is a motion to declare Nicholas Dowling, of Westminster Township, a lunatic. Meredith, Fisher and McDonald for motion. Dowling, who is a farmer, is the owner of some \$10,000 worth of farm lands and other property, and the London and Western Trust Company, as trustee of the estate, applies for the motion. The unfortunate man was confined in the asylum for six months some time ago.

MAY LEASE ARSENAL

English Engineer Makes Proposal for Docks at Ferrol.

Madrid, April 18.—The Epoca says that an English engineer, a member of an English shipping company, is at the moment in Madrid, in conference with the minister of marine, Capt. Fernandez Nino, recently, did so to discuss the leasing of the arsenal at Ferrol. He submitted plans and offered all guarantees. The minister maintained great reserve and stated that he would consider the matter.

It was reported in Madrid last month that the government had already decided to lease the arsenal and that several vessels on the new naval programme would be built there. One of the conditions of the lease was said to be that some of the members of the board of directors should be Spaniards.

The arsenal at Ferrol is one of the principal in Spain and the harbor is one of the finest in Europe. It is easy of defense, as it is approached by a long and narrow strait along which forts could be erected. The arsenal and dockyard were founded in the latter part of the eighteenth century by Charles III. They cover twenty-five acres and contain many magnificent docks and warehouses.

UNDER QUAKE WRECKAGE.

Ayutla, Mexico, April 18.—Seven persons were buried under wreckage killed at this place by the earthquake April 14. The wounded number 37. Many buildings were thrown down and those which are still standing are in danger of falling. None of the houses are habitable, and the citizens are camped under improvised tents. The losses are estimated at approximately \$200,000. No advices have been received from outlying districts of this section.

WATERWAYS COMMISSION

Dr. King Retires, and Is Succeeded by W. J. Stewart, of Ottawa.

Buffalo, April 18.—The international waterways commission met here today and considered a bill pending in Congress to dam the St. Lawrence at Long Sault, near Marre, N. Y.

Among the commissioners were William J. Stewart, of Ottawa, Mr. Stewart is a new member, taking the place made vacant by the resignation of Dr. King, of Ottawa.

The building of the dam, it is said, would increase the horse-power developed from 4,000 to over 45,000 and the channel, which is now useless, will be made navigable.

NEW MOROCCAN CRISIS

Concessions to German Firms Arouse the French Agent.

Tangier, April 18.—The French minister, Mr. Regnault, and the minister of Germany, Dr. Rosen, conferred today relative to the Sultan's concessions to German firms. Dr. Rosen took the ground that they do not infringe on the rights of the Algerian convention, as they emanated directly from the Sultan. Mr. Regnault held the opposite view. He declared that it was understood that after the signature of the convention all efforts to obtain concessions would cease until the Moroccan state bank was in operation. The French minister decided to refer the question to Paris.

NEW CRATERS OPENED

Putehue Still in Eruption and Is Doing Immense Damage.

New York, April 18.—A dispatch from Lima, Peru, says: The volcano Putehue in the Province of Valdivia, Chile, is still in active eruption, and new craters have opened. The losses in the neighboring country are enormous, and the inhabitants are panic-stricken.

Showers of red-hot ashes are falling, and there are continued earthquake shocks, accompanied by underground explosions. Absolute darkness would prevail, but for the light from several fires over an extent of six miles.

A great number of cattle have been killed near Lake Ranco. Several brooks which had furnished drinking water for the people have dried up. The inhabitants, ruined, are fleeing in all directions. The Government sent assistance.
