Civic coalyards were again inforesed by the London Trades and Labor Council at its meeting on Wednesday night, and a motion was made by Delegate Hessel that the city council be asked to reconsider the matter.

The indorsement of the militia act by the ministerial alliance caused some discussion, members of the council stating that the ministers should devote a little of their energy to reducing the high cost of living.




