

ASK PERMISSION TO OPEN SCHOOLS ONE HOUR EARLIER

Board of Education Will Thus
Have Summer Time.

ONE TRUSTEE OPPOSED

Beating Around Bush, Says
W. N. Manning, and He
Voted Against It.

London schools will continue on the daylight saving time. This was decided at the adjourned meeting of the board which was held yesterday afternoon. With W. N. Manning opposing, the board passed a resolution, authorizing Secretary R. M. McElheran to write the minister of education, asking for authority to open the schools at 8 o'clock, standard time, and close them at 3, standard time. Thus did the board circumvent the action D. H. Flannigan started to compel the schools to revert to standard time. As the new hours, if they are approved, and it is confidently expected that they will be approved by the minister, correspond to the present hours daylight time there will be no change in the time at all.

At the meeting the following trustees were present: Chairman J. S. Barnard, H. Hayman, Thomas Rowe, Mrs. David Williams, Mrs. Ronald Harris, W. N. Manning, Mrs. A. T. Langford, Edwin Smith and W. J. Tillman.

H. Hayman, chairman of No. 1 committee, introduced the resolution, asking authority to change the time in the public schools to 8 and 3, instead of 9 to 4, standard time, and W. J. Tillman, chairman of No. 3 committee, sponsored a similar resolution, relating to the Collegiate Institute. W. N. Manning thought the board would make a mistake if it adopted the course laid out in the resolutions.

Beating Around Bush.
"This is beating around the bush," said he. "Our only safe plan is to follow the council. The course suggested will have bad effects. Personally, I am in favor of daylight saving, but in view of the turn it has taken in London I think we should revert to standard time and to the usual hours."

Mrs. Edwards thought Trustees Manning could not have been at the meeting in the chamber of commerce on Wednesday night, or he would have taken a different view. She was strongly in favor of daylight saving time for the schools.

Chairman Barnard misunderstood her as speaking against the motion. She explained that she favored the motion, and, turning to W. N. Manning, she said: "You are not in favor of it, are you?"

Trustee Manning admitted that he was not.

The two resolutions carried, with all in favor but Mr. Manning.

These two resolutions referred to the public schools and the collegiate institute only, and the question arose as to the technical school. The other members of the board tried to shelve the responsibility of sponsoring the resolution changing the hours at the Technical School to Trustees Manning. He absolutely refused, and Mrs. Edwards undertook this burden for him. It was passed also, with Mr. Manning voting in opposition. The secretary was instructed to communicate with the minister of education and ask for an early reply.

WOMAN'S MUSIC CLUB SEASON IS BROUGHT TO CLOSE

Annual Meeting Held—Big
Drive For Members.

The annual meeting held on Thursday afternoon in the Normal School brought to a close one of the most successful seasons in the long history of the Woman's Music Club. The membership has exceeded any previous year, 228, including associate members, and the report of the treasurer, Miss Stevens, read in her absence by Miss Murphy Morrison, showed a balance on hand of \$200.

Commenting upon the large membership, the president, Mrs. G. D. Buckstadter, stated that it is her ambition to see the membership reach the hundred mark next year. The assistant secretary, Mrs. Charles E. Percy, suggested that each of the members of this year's membership would bring a new member next year, the objective would be attained.

Provided such a large membership can be attained, it will be possible to include several artistic concerts in the regular membership course.

So entirely was the club with the work of the officers during the past year that, on recommendation of the nomination committee, of which Mrs. Edwin Pauli was convener, they were returned to office by a standing vote. In accepting the presidency a third time, Mrs. Dockstadter expressed her cordial thanks to the executive committee and the club as a whole for loyal support.

The report of the executive secretary, Mrs. Victor Blackwell, called attention to the fact that three outstanding treats had been provided for the members, as well as nine or ten regular recitals, many of which artists' concerts, given by Madame Eleanor Hazard, Peacock, dramatic soprano of Detroit; Sarto, the celebrated baritone of the Metropolitan Opera; and John Garvin (Katherine Hale), who appeared in a lecture recital.

So successful has the plan proved of holding the recitals alternately in the afternoon and evening during the past season that it was decided to continue next season.

D. MANNESS' MOTHER IS DEAD IN TORONTO

The sympathy of a wide circle of friends will be extended to Ald. S. R. Manness, whose mother died yesterday in Toronto. Mrs. Manness was in her 85th year, and up to two years ago was a resident of this city. She came to Canada from the Isle of Jersey in 1872 and made London her home.

Besides Ald. Manness, three other sons, Fred of Manitoba, James of Buffalo and Charles of Toronto, and Mrs. Hamilton of Detroit, survive.

The remains will be brought to London for interment at Mount Pleasant Cemetery on Saturday.

TWO INGERSOLL HOMES BEREAVED OF MOTHERS

INGERSOLL, May 8.—Following an extended illness, the death of Mrs. Waugh, wife of Richard Waugh, occurred yesterday. Deceased was in her 70th year, and had been ill for about a year. She had been a resident of Ingersoll for eight years and was a member of St. James' Anglican Church.

Mrs. Thompson, wife of William Thompson, died at the family residence, King street west, after an illness of extended duration. Deceased was in her 40th year, and formerly resided near Mossley. Besides her husband, she is survived by one daughter, Mrs. George Wright Jun. of Ingersoll, and one son overseas. The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the cemetery.
