EDDIE CICOTTE TO PITCH FIRST GAME

Thousands of Baseball Fans Reach Cincinnati For Opening.

HOTELS ARE JAMMED

Both Teams Are Reported To Be in First-Class Condition.

Cincinnati, Sept. 30.—With the stage set for the opening of the world's series here tomorrow Cincinnati assumed a gala appearance today as the throngs of gala appearance today as the throngs of visitors began to arrive to witness the initial struggles of the baseball classic. Hotel corridors were jammed to the limit, and the congregation grew greater as the day advanced and the special trains began to arrive.

With every one of the 35,000 seats sold, the unlucky applicants for tickets were willing to pay almost any price for a seat for the opening game. If the ticket speculators had any seats for sale they did not advertise their wares. There were a few individuals, however,

There were a few individuals, however, who demanded from \$50 to \$75 for a set of box seats for three games. The face value of these tickets was \$16.50. August Herrmann, president of the Cincinnati club, declared that he never thought it was possible for so much interest in a world series, and regretted that Redland Field did not have a seating capacity of 200.000 instead of 35,000.
