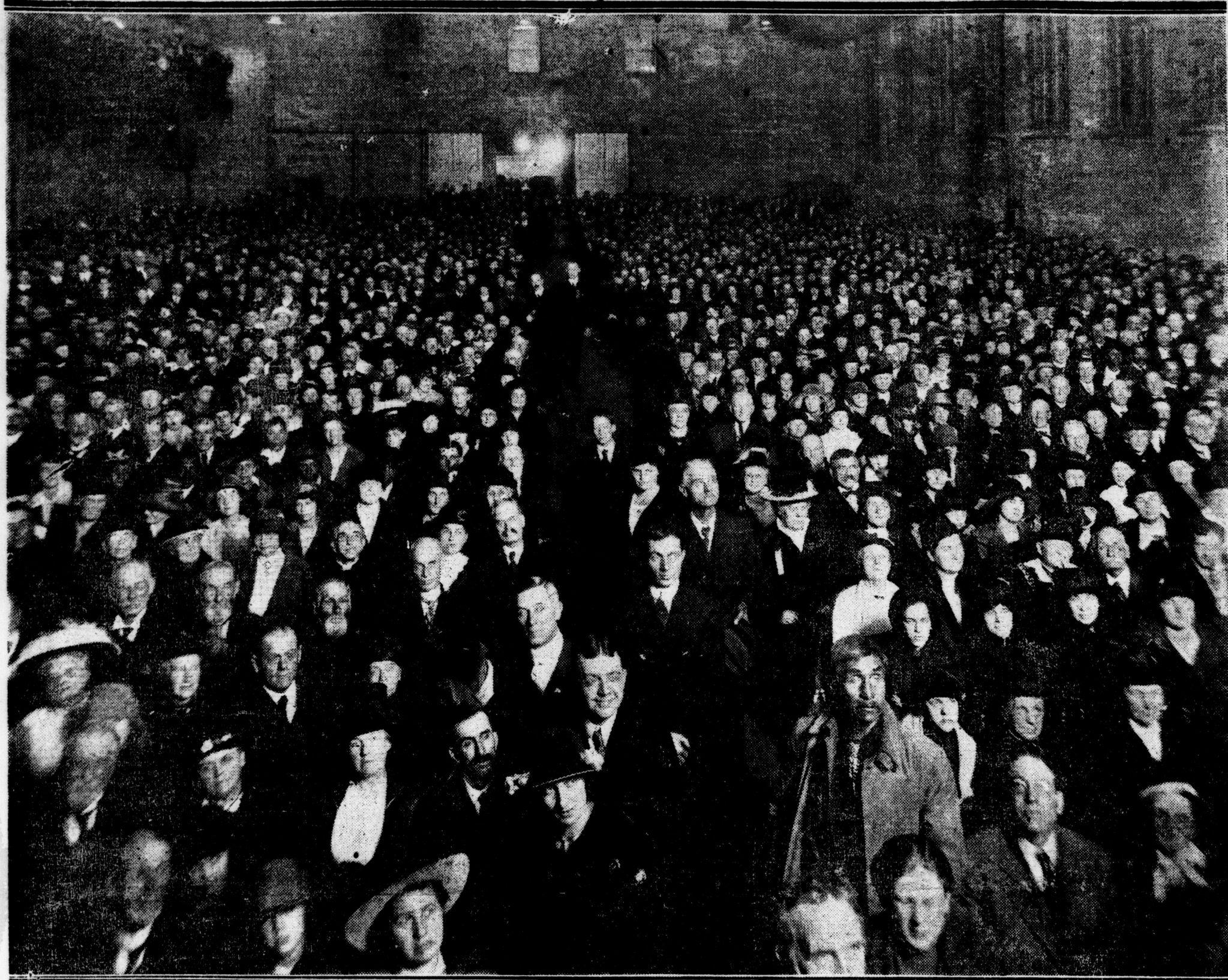

MUST BE VACCINATED OR KEEP OUT OF UNITED STATES; ORDER ISSUE INCLUDES RAILROADERS

Canadians Must Present Certificate Proving Operation Has Been Performed Within Last Thirty Days—Law Is Effective 7 o'Clock Wednesday Morning.

Either there will be an epidemic of vaccination in Canada or very few residents of the Dominion will enter the United States, as the result of an order issued by the American Government and received here today. It states that all persons desiring to cross the border must produce a certificate showing that they have been vaccinated within the last 30 days. There are to be no exceptions to the rule, even railroad men being forced to comply with the order.

GOVERNMENT ROAD IS NOT INTENDED TO BE A MOTOR SPEEDWAY

Hon. F. C. Biggs, Minister of Public Works, Inspects Provincial Highways.

OUTLINES HIS PLANS
Good Surface Road, Easily Maintained, To Be Constructed.

Toronto, Nov. 25.—Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works, who has been inspecting the roads in Ontario, says that his idea is not to build a speedway from one end of the province to another, but to give a good surface road, with absolutely perfect and continuous maintenance, whereby the roads at no time become impassable, but are always in a reasonable condition for the travelling public. The new Government, he said, has no intention of making a speedway, but will give the people and tourists a road that is fit and adequate for the traffic that flows over it. Mr. Biggs announced himself as being pleased with the work that had been done on the Niagara roads from Hamilton to Lewiston. There was some sort of accident near Paris during the trip, but no one was hurt.

CAPTAIN THINKS HE IS SOLE SURVIVOR FROM LAST VOYAGE

Master of Steamer Myron in State of Collapse.

GIVES FEW DETAILS

Ship Encountered Storm That Soon Battered Her to Pieces.

Port William, Nov. 25.—Capt. C. Neale of the steamer Myron was rescued yesterday in a state of complete collapse from the floating wreckage of the pilot house of the steamer Myron by the crew of the freighter W. C. Pratt, bound light for Port William for grain. Blue with the cold and his clothing torn and ripped by the elements, he was unable to move until he had been taken aboard and revived with stimulants, when he said he believed himself to be the sole survivor of the Myron, which ran into a tremendous gale near Whitefish Point, while towing the barge Miztec, bound up the lakes for Duluth. It was early on Saturday that the storm was encountered, and two hours later the Myron began to sink. Pumps were worked to their fullest capacity, but in vain, and the battered wreck broke to pieces, leaving the master floating alone on the pilot house, the sole survivor of the Myron's crew of sixteen, and also, he believed, of the sixteen men aboard the barge Miztec. Capt. Neale was unable to give more than a few details of the wreck, being almost dead from the exposure to the cold water of Lake Superior and from the shock of the wreck.

BISHOP OF LONDON APPEALS FOR HIGHER STANDARD IN ALL PLAYS

London, Nov. 25.—Correspondence of the Associated Press.—The Bishop of London, who says he enjoys a good play as much as anybody, presided at a conference the other day of representatives of theatrical managers, authors, actors and critics. It was held at the instigation of the London council for the promotion of public morality to consider the best means for preventing improper public performances.

The bishop said the council was not in the slightest degree opposed to theatres or music halls. The people needed entertainment and a good laugh was good for everybody. "But what we will not tolerate," he added, "is filth. We are not going to have people go to theatres to hear things which will degrade them. The Christian people of London intend to put a stop to that sort of thing. We fully believe the great majority of managers, authors and actor-managers are also anxious to stop it, and it is not the wish of the great acting profession that filthy performances should be given in London."

Sidney Valentine, president of the Actors' Association, said the tendency of the theatres lately had been downward.

Jugo-Slavs Threatening War on Italians; Only Immediate Move by Allies Can Stop It

JUGO-SLAVS
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Geneva, Monday, Nov. 24.—Telegrams received by the Serbian bureau at Berne from Belgrade, Zara and Spalato, convey the impression that only prompt interference by the Allies can prevent war over the Adriatic situation, as the Jugo-Slavs are said to have lost patience and to be ready to fight the Italians.

APPEALS TO BIG NATIONS.

Paris, Monday, Nov. 24.—Dispatches confirming reports from Geneva that the situation along the eastern shore of the Adriatic is critical, are issued by the Jugo-Slav bureau here. The bureau says the Jugo-Slav Government has asked its ministers at Paris, London and Washington to draw the attention of these governments to the dangerous situation arising from d'Annunzio's raids and those he is reported about to make.

SOLDIER SAVES WOMAN'S LIFE; IS LEFT FORTUNE

Youngstown, Nov. 24.—Elmer Flickinton of Columbiana, Ohio, today is \$100,000 richer because he saved the life of a Montgomery, Alabama, woman two years ago. Flickinton, while a private in the 37th Ohio National Guard Division in training at Camp Sheridan, rescued the woman in a runaway accident. Today he was notified by an agent of the Cohasset Iron and Mining Company that, by the woman's land leases of mining rights on lands near Montgomery had been given to him.

STEAMER RUNS AGROUND.

Bulgaria's Wheat Crop Biggest in Country's History

Largest Elevators Are Being Constructed To Handle Grain.

Sofia, Nov. 24.—Large elevators are being constructed at Varna, on the Black Sea coast of Bulgaria, to handle the country's wheat crop, which is estimated as being the largest in the history of Bulgaria, and worth \$250,000,000. The work is being carried forward by Premier Stambuliski in the hope of securing outside help for regulating exchange rate prices and stimulating trade. Clothes are scarce and luxuries are considered contraband in Bulgaria, and any shipments of these commodities into the country must be exchanged for other goods. MEX CO FAILS TO SEND REPLY TO U. S. NOTE

American Cabinet To Fully Discuss Unpleasant Situation That Has Arisen.

Washington, Nov. 25.—Secretary of State Lansing went into the cabinet meeting today without a reply to the American note demanding the immediate release of W. O. Jenkins, United States consular agent at Puebla, and warning the Mexican Government that further molestation of the agent would seriously affect the relations between the United States and Mexico. Mexico's failure to make a prompt reply apparently has created an unfavorable impression in official circles, and the cabinet was expected to go over the whole Mexican situation.

RUMANIA AND SERBIA ARE TO GET ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY TO SIGN

Time Limit Is Placed For Signatures to Austrian Treaty.

Paris, Nov. 25.—Rumania is to be given another chance to sign the Austrian peace treaty, a limited period being named within which she may attach her signature. Permission to sign is also to be given Serbia.

The supreme council made this decision this morning, at the same time deciding that a protocol be opened on November 27, permitting Rumania to sign the peace treaty with Bulgaria within eight days, this period to apply also to her signature to the treaty of St. Germain with Austria.

QUEBEC PARLIAMENT MEMBER IS CHARGED WITH IMPEDING ACT

Dr. Ernest Poulin Is Committed For Voluntary Statement.

Montreal, Nov. 25.—Dr. Ernest Poulin, who represents Laurier division in the Quebec Legislature, was committed for voluntary statement yesterday by Judge Leet after several sittings of the court hearing the charge against him of having "impeded the military service act." The case will be further continued on Thursday, for which day voluntary statement was made. The action is taken by the federal authorities. The evidence during the hearing was chiefly from Louis P. Mercier of Sherbrooke, a young man in medical class E, who, according to his evidence, was prevented by Poulin from enlisting in the military service. Mercier alleged that he had been persuaded by Dr. Poulin to meet Stanislas Poulin, lawyer, St. John and Amable Leclerc, also of St. John, Quebec, who were aware that he was classed as "category E," and ask him to impersonate the name of Amable Leclerc, a son of the Guy street barracks in this city. He consented to do so for the consideration of \$500. Jos. Benoit, father of Amable Leclerc, testified that he had given his son \$500 to secure his exemption from the military service. He stated he had met Dr. Poulin only once; it was at the latter's premises, 125 Boulevard, Montreal.

MENSHEVIKI TO TAKE PART IN AFFAIRS OF NEW RUSSIAN GOVT.

Peace Offer Will Be To Kolchak and Denekine.

London, Nov. 25.—A German wireless dispatch received here says the Russian Bolshevik paper Pravda of Moscow announces that a new Russian Government is projected in which the Mensheviks (Moderates), will participate, and that the new government will be headed by Vladimir Lenin, the Bolshevik premier, and will convene a national assembly in Moscow.

EGYPTIAN MINISTER OF FINANCE TO FORM A NEW GOVERNMENT

Cairo, Wednesday, Nov. 13.—Youssef Wahba Pasha, minister of finance in the ministry of Premier Kuchik Pasha, has accepted the mandate to form a new cabinet, according to reports here.

GERMANY TO BE RESPONSIBLE IF PEACE TREATY IS NOT PUT INTO EFFECT ON DECEMBER 1

Supreme Council in Note To Head of German Peace Delegation Requests That Berlin Government Definitely State Its Intentions Regarding Protocol.

Paris, Nov. 25.—Surprise at the departure of Dr. Simson, head of the plenipotentiaries sent by Germany to this city in connection with the protocol relative to the carrying out of the terms of the armistice, was expressed in a note delivered to Kurt von Lersner, head of the German delegation at Versailles, by the supreme council last night.

If the treaty of Versailles is not put into force by December 1, the note adds, the responsibility will lie with the German Government, as the departure of Dr. Simson inevitably delays further conferences which must be held. Dr. von Lersner is asked, in conclusion, to state what are the intentions of the German Government.

It was learned today that von Lersner sent a letter to Secretary Dutasta of the peace conference, last Friday, to the effect that the head of the plenipotentiaries had become convinced, after the consultations he had held in Paris, that he must consult the German Government regarding the protocol, especially as the national assembly would have to approve the decisions reached. The von Lersner letter protested against the question of the repatriation of prisoners again being bound up with that of putting the treaty into effect, it being pointed out that the allied governments should have separated these issues. If the promise of France was not kept, the letter declared, German public opinion would not have confidence in any further promise France might make. The letter, in this connection, drew attention to an article published recently in the Presse De Paris on the surrender of war criminals. Premier Clemenceau, as president of the peace conference, replied on Saturday, saying that von Lersner's letter

Shock at Honor to Son Caused Death of Hermann Raney

Father of Attorney-General of Ontario Dies At Age of Eighty-Four.

Toronto, Nov. 25.—To the shock at the honor of the elevation of his son to the post of attorney-general of the province of Ontario is attributed the death of Hermann Raney, aged 84, father of the Hon. W. E. Raney, who was recently appointed to that important position in the Drury provincial cabinet. The remains of Mr. Raney are being interred today in the little village of Aulaville, in Dundas County. He died in Rochester last Sunday night at the home of his daughter there. The late Mr. Raney was of United Empire Loyalist stock and farmed in Dundas County for many years. Hon. W. E. Raney, Rev. W. H. Raney of Renfrew, Ont., who is another surviving son, and three sisters from Rochester are the chief mourners at the funeral today.

COAL SHORTAGE IS FORCING REDUCTION IN TRAIN SERVICE

Cut in Passenger and Freight Trains Becomes Effective On Saturday.

Montreal, Nov. 25.—Drastic reduction in passenger and, possibly, freight service on the Canadian railways, on account of the shortage of bituminous coal were announced today as a result of meetings of the railway officials to consider conditions following the strike in the United States. These reductions, so far as announced by the Canadian Railway War Board, will chiefly affect the Grand Trunk, No. 115, which leaves here for Detroit at 11:50 a.m., one of the trains on the Stratford line, and one of the Huron and Bruce trains, possibly the morning one, will not run, it is said. On the C. P. R., there is not even a rumor of the possible cancellations in the division. Shortage of fuel for the engines is given as the cause.

PLOT TO MURDER GREEK PREMIER IS DISCOVERED

Overthrow of Monarchy Is Planned To Accompany Assassination.

CONSPIRATORS CONFESS

Those Arrested Were Formerly Officers Under King Constantine.

Athens, Nov. 24.—A plot to assassinate Premier Venizelos and overthrow the monarchy has been discovered here, and many arrests have been made by the authorities.

PLOTTERS CONFESS.
Athens, Monday, Nov. 24.—Plotters arrested following the discovery of a conspiracy to assassinate the Greek premier, overthrow the present regime and re-establish King Constantine on the throne, confessed to the authorities. They were formerly officers under King Constantine. They will be tried before courts-martial.

A number of the Opposition leaders visited M. Clemenceau yesterday, and offered to co-operate with the Government in continuing session. The public remains calm.

WOULD DELAY PAYMENT OF INTEREST ON MONEY ADVANCED TO ALLIES

London, Nov. 25.—A plan is under discussion by the British and American Governments under which the payment of interest on advances by Great Britain and the United States to the Allies in the course of the war, and also on advances by the United States to Great Britain, would be postponed for three years. It was announced in the House of Commons today by Austen Chamberlain, the chancellor of the exchequer.
