Ethel Maude Little Has a Long List of Matrimonial Ventures.

Henry Pierce, who was charged with bigamy in police court this morning. elected to be tried at the assize court, and was bailed to appear in one week for examination. He pleaded gusty to the second marriage, but said that there was justification for it. Ethel Maude Little pleaded guilt to a similar charge, and was allowed to go for a week on her own bail. She, however, wanted to change her plea. Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon has not accepted her application yet, but has not ruled it

Pierce declared that he had not heard from his wife for eleven years. He thought that after seven years, according to English law, he could remarry. Crown Attorney J. B. McKillop will consult the attorney-general regarding the obtaining of the evidence of Pierce's first wife, who resides in England. Either the evidence will be taken there or she will be brought here. The female prisoner said that since her marriage to Pierce she had lived in the United States with a Mr. Pickerell as his wife. and also with a John Walsh as his wife. She had been deported from Canada. Her counsel declared that she had two children and had been supporting them. 
