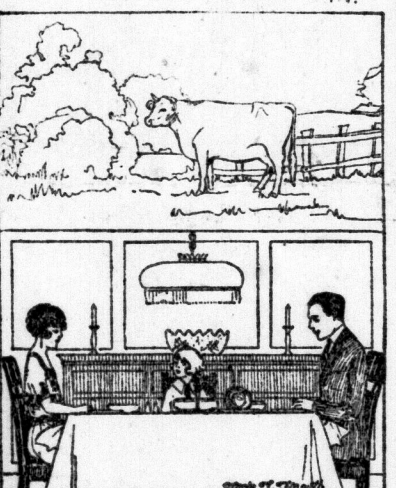

HOME ECONOMICS

A certain amount, therefore, of animal protein is surely desirable. We need to get about half of our protein supply from meat, eggs and milk, but to get it all from these sources is extravagant, when peas, beans, and wheat can give it us more cheaply.

Milk and eggs are needed in the diet for other reasons than their protein content, but we eat lean meat practically only just for its protein. Probably a daily portion of lean meat is a fair amount for the average person. The rest of his protein he should get from milk, eggs, wheat and the vegetables. As people eat too much meat, but not enough peas, beans, and wheat, the whole, the most evenly developed, and our aims should be, not to give up meat, but to eat enough and not too much of it.

ALLIANCE FRANCAISE
HEARS TALK ON THE
TYPICAL FRENCH GIRL

Miss Manley and Miss Cronyn Win Honors in French Play.

An address in French by Miss Chaloufour of Toronto University was the principal feature of a most interesting meeting of the Alliance Francaise, held at the Institute of Musical Art on Saturday evening. She spoke on the development of the character of the French girl as it is shown in French literature through the different periods, beginning with the eighteenth century. Her address was easily followed, so clearly was it given.

Another very attractive feature of the program was the presentation of a short French play, "Miss Peacock," by Miss Mary Manley and Miss Kathleen Cronyn. The work here was so excellently done that the club hopes to have it repeated at a future meeting. The characters represented were an eccentric English woman traveling through France (which role was played by Miss Mary Manley) and her French maid (Miss Kathleen Cronyn), who found great difficulty in understanding the strange mixture of French and English of her mistress. Dr. Shanks of Western University occupied the chair in the absence of the president, Mr. Ibbotson Leonard.

The next meeting of the club will be held jointly with the Western University Extension Department on January 21, the speaker being Prof. Charles Upson Clark of Yale University, and his subject "In Troubadour Land," illustrated with lantern slides.

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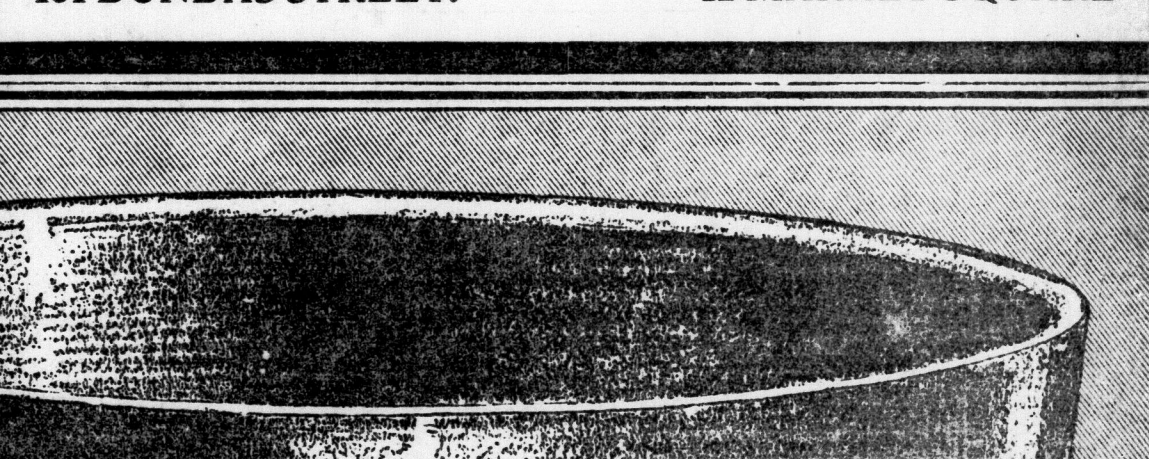
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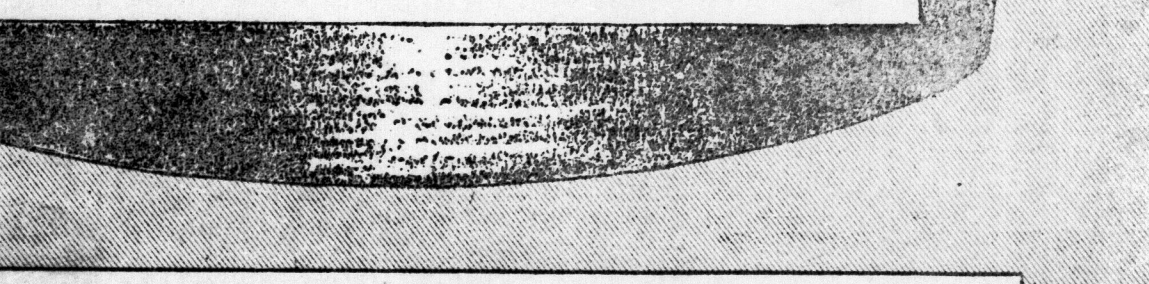
