## BIG MILLS WILL RISE AROUND POWER PLANT

Kenora Looks for Expansion as Result of Winnipeg River Development.

KENORA, June 16.—(Special).—The proprietors of the dam above Kenora have contracted to sell their power, for, it is stated, \$1,000,000 to a New York syndicate thru the instrumentality of Andrew Anderson (of Winnipeg and New York), who opened up the negotiations directly from the commencement. Acting under instructions, this week he submitted to the town council a proposition showing an intention of the syndicate to immediately erect plant and machinery for opening up an immense pulp and paper industry, provided that an exemption from taxation be accorded for a period of 10 years, and a fixed assessment of \$3000 for a further 15 years.

After considerable discussion, in the course of which Mr. Anderson pointed out that nearly 1000 work people would be employed in that industry when in operation and that the plant would probably cost something in the

## SUBURBAN SERVICE IS BEING IMPROVED

C.P.R. Make Alterations in the Time Table and May Order More Motor Cars.

Fifteen days' trial of the experimental suburban motor to Brampton, put on for the benefit of suburbanites, has pretty well convinced the C.P.R. passenger officials of the practicability of the argument that the district between Toronto and Brampton not only required, but warranted, the introduction of a special service. Fifteen days' trial has also given the C.P.R. officials a confidence in the capabilities and reliability of the car that has exceeded their most sanguine expectations, and it would not be surprising if an order for six more cars built on the same design, went forth to Montreal before the summer is ended.

This will mean that other C.P.R. cars radiating from Toronto will soon be equipped for suburban traffic, and that the service to Brampton will be improved to the extent of at least two local trains each way.

Likewise, 15 days have served to better acquaint the company with most urgent requirements of the people served by the inter-urban motor, with the result that several changes have been made in the schedule.

For instance, it was found that 6.15 p.m. was somewhat of a late hour for the average daily passenger to have to leave the city on his way home from business, and the new time-table which went into effect yesterday, reads "leave Toronto 5.45 p.m."

From the many interviews The World has had with people who have been making regular use of this train, this should meet with general satisfaction all along the line. At least in the interim, until two out-bound cars may be brought into commission—one shortly after 5 and the other just after 6—as has been suggested.

Then, too, there were many complaints that the car was not landing people in Toronto on the morning trip in time for them to be at the office at 9 o'clock, and there has been a re-adjustment in this regard.

It was found that upon approaching Toronto the numerous stops made it impossible to keep up with the schedule. Therefore, the time between the stations nearer Brampton has been shortened, giving more latitude on the latter end of the east run in order to land in Toronto precisely at 8.45 a.m.

The first trip was made yesterday morning on time. There were 64 passengers.

## BIG LOSSES OF LUMBER.

FREDERICTON, N.B., June 16.—(Special).—Of late weeks' lumber has been cut, about 25,000,000 feet of logs are now hung up on the St. John River and tributaries. If it had not been for several big dams breaking away practically all of the lumber on upper St. John and its tributaries would have come out. The St. John Lumber Company alone will lose 10,000,000 feet.

## Protect Schools From Fire.

C. H. Bishop, superintendent of school buildings, intends to hasten steps during the summer to have schools protected from fire. He plans to have iron stairways installed, to replace all wooden partitions with brick and wooden doors with metal, and to have all basements made fireproof.

## 3 YEARS FOR HORSE THEIF.

New Yorker Gets Summary Justice in Orangeville Court.

ORANGEVILLE, June 16.—(Special).—A young man, Harry Thomas, who claims to live in New York City, was today sentenced by the police magistrate to three years in Kingston for stealing a horse and buggy from Allan McDougall of Hillsburg, while being kept in the sheds of the Hotel Alexandra here on Saturday afternoon. The outfit was valued at \$270 and the prisoner endeavored to sell it to some Caledon farmers for \$20. He was captured Saturday evening near Charleston.

## J. CAMPBELL WHITE TO ADDRESS THE ANGLICANS

The missionary meeting in connection with the annual meeting of the synod of the Diocese of Toronto will be held to-night at St. James' Cathedral school house at 8 o'clock. This year the meeting is to be a laymen's missionary movement meeting, the idea being to interest the outside clergy and lay representatives attending the synod in the movement. The committee in charge are fortunate in securing Mr. J. Campbell White of New York, who comes to Toronto to address the meeting. Rev. Charles A. Short, missionary in Japan, now on furlough, will also speak. The meeting is open to ladies as well as to men, and a general invitation is extended to all interested.

## ANXIOUS FOR CLOSURE.

Liberals Express Themselves in Caucus—Program to Be Carried Out.

OTTAWA, June 16.—The Liberal senators and members were given an opportunity in the party caucus this morning of expressing their views in regard to matters before parliament. The caucus was presided over by Peter Macdonald, of South Bruce, and was followed by an announcement that the ministerial program of legislation be carried out.

There is intense resentment in the Liberal ranks arising out of the delays of the present session, and this sentiment has already found voice in the demand for the reform of the parliamentary rules and the introduction of a system of closure as the only effective check to obstructive tactics. The government following in the house of commons proclaim themselves ready to face their constituents when the time for dissolution comes and are in no wise dismayed by the results of the recent provincial elections.

To-day's caucus brought no announcement in regard to the contentious election bill, but the work of revising the provincial lists of Manitoba is now under way and Liberals claim to be in receipt of numerous complaints as to the way in which it is being done.

## LAWYER WAS WRATHY.

Frank Slattery's Wild Irish Rose Against Mr. Starr.

Lawyers engaged in wordy strife in the police court yesterday afternoon. When Joseph A. Genereux, charged with trespassing on the premises of Mrs. Mary A. Westlake at 363 Dupont street, was forced into the witness box by the magistrate against the will of his counsel, Frank Slattery.

Mr. Slattery was mad. When J. R. L. Starr, K.C., appearing for Mrs. Westlake declared that Genereux, who claimed a title to the property, would not do so should an execution be issued against it, Mr. Slattery took a journey high into the air.

Of the magistrate Mr. Slattery enquired ironically, "Don't the laws of evidence go for anything in this court?"

To Mr. Starr he remarked: "If you were a gentleman you would not make those impertinent remarks."
