KEEPING OUT OF WAR IS HARD, SAYS WILSON

U.S. Will Mix Into, Not This, But Next Great Conflict.

Cincinnati, O., Oct. 26.—Discussing the relation of the U. S. to the European war, President Wilson today declared that "this is the last war that involves the world that the U. S. can keep out of."

He gave as his reason his belief that "the business of neutrality is over," and that war now has such a scale that the positions of neutrals sooner or later becomes intolerable.

He added that the nations of the world must get together and say, "No body can hereafter be neutral as respects the disturbance of the world's peace for an object which the world's opinion cannot sanction."

FRENCH MOVE OVER ALBANIAN BORDER

Allies North of Salonica Strengthen Contact With Italians.

SERBIANS WIN RIDGE

Throw Lines Further Forward Into Macedonia by Sharp Stroke.

London, Oct. 26.—Pressing forward on the extreme right on the front north of Salonica, the French combed their junction with the Italians from Avona by occupying Laletta on the boundary line between Greece and Albania...

The Serbian force operating north of the Starok Grab mountains has seized the fortified height at the confluence of the Gerna and the Struma rivers...

When night fell the French found that their front had given way nowhere.

The total number of unwounded prisoners taken and counted in the three days' fighting exceeds 6000.

The French are greatly encouraged by their success when they take Fort Vaux, which is liable to fall at any time, they are prepared for another sweep forward.

What has evoked comment is the delay incurred by the Germans in the organization of their counter-attacks.

BRITISH SOLDIER ALONE CAPTURES HUNDRED HUNS

Pte. Thomas Jones Wins Victoria Cross by Great Exploit.

London, Oct. 27.—One of fifty Victoria Crosses, the award of which is made in today's London Gazette, is to Private Thomas Jones, who, according to the official account, after killing three snipers who were shooting at him, entered the German trenches and single-handedly disarmed 102 Germans...

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FRENCH REPEL FOUR ATTACKS FROM VERDUN

Extremely Violent Fighting Follows German Counter-Attempts.

HOLD FRONT INTACT

Allies Cause Tremendous Losses—Take Five Thousand Prisoners.

London, Oct. 26.—Fighting raged at Verdun today as violently as any which has raged around this historic citadel since the beginning of the war...

The first attack began at 2.30 this morning and the next began at 11 in the afternoon...

The French gunners and their 75's proved equal to the occasion and they and the French infantry poured into the German advancing waves such a destructive fire that the foe could not see it and had to reel back broken...

Came On in Four Waves.

Just one hour after the second attack the Germans launched another more powerful than the first two...

MR. TANSEY TO THE TORONTO WORLD

Immediately upon receipt of the telegram from The World, Mr. Tansey sent the following reply:

"Owing to tremendous rush of orders for the British Red Cross, Trafalgar Day collections and other patriotic collections throughout Canada during the past month, it was utterly impossible to manufacture here all the celluloid tags and flags required...

The military cross has been awarded to Chaplains W. H. Thompson, W. E. Kidd and A. H. McGregor.

TWO CANADIAN SOLDIERS RECEIVE VICTORIA CROSS

Acting Corporal Leo Clarke, Winnipeg, Routed Twenty Germans Single-handed, and Pte. Kerr, Nova Scotian, Captured Sixty of Enemy.

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FOE RETREATS BEFORE ONSET OF ROUMANIA

Allies Drive Germans Across Northwestern Frontier to Transylvania.

ENEMY DRIVES SOUTH

Efforts of Von Mackensen in Dobrudja Begin to Weaken.

London, Oct. 23.—Putting their full weight into the struggle the Roumanians have cleared Moldavia of the Germans, and they have thrown them back thru Tolgea, Gyimes, Biaz and Oltuz passes into Transylvania...

The Roumanians have also captured Mount Kerekharas on the Transylvanian front south of Biaz...

On the northeastern Transylvanian front the Roumanians have arrested the progress of superior forces of the enemy.

Petrograd today also reported a lessening of the pressure of the forces under Von Mackensen in the Dobrudja...

The Germans dilate on the value of Constanza as a seaport and on the importance of the Cernavoda bridge...

The Roumanians were divided into two bodies by the offensive of Von Mackensen, and that one portion withdrew into Roumania over the bridge...

They also assert that the capture of Cernavoda is a serious blow to the German position.

Telegraphic information received late last night in response to a dispatch forwarded by The World seeking an explanation from T. P. Tansey...

The mistake was discovered and notification was made to headquarters and the officials there had a busy time scurrying over the city in an endeavor to stop the circulation of the enemy flags...

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The Teutonic badges handed to the World for inspection were placed under a strong magnifying glass in order to ascertain the name of the maker...

On this discovery The World immediately despatched the following telegram to T. P. Tansey at Montreal:

"Red Cross German relief flags found mixed with Belgian Tag Day flags sold in Toronto today. Will you explain how they came to be there? Stamped German Mfg. Company, Boston."

Five in One Package.

Needless to say the discovery yesterday morning caused the official concern. According to the captain of the team which covered the district around Spadina avenue and St. Patrick street, five enemy flags were found in one package of tags given her for distribution...
