CANADIANS TO HELP **ABBEY RESTORATION**

Ancient Valhalla of British Nations in Grave Danger of Irreparable Ruin.

Hon. Lionel Clarke, lieutenantgovernor, yesterday afternoon called
a meeting of prominent citizens in the
board room of the Bank of Commerce
for the purpose of considering action
in connection with the appeal that is
being made for contributions towards
the restoration of Westminster Abbey.
For several years the fabric of this
pre-eminent storehouse of British history has been falling more and more
into disrepair, until a condition has
arisen which if not speedily dealt
with in a large way threatens the
very existence of the venerable building.

Some time ago the dean of Westminster made an appeal to the public of the British Isles for contributions towards the much-needed restoration. He pointed out that certain older parts of the building were in actual danger of falling and that unless a comprehensive scheme of restoration were set afoot the priceless relic might be altogether lost to future generations. He also pointed out that Westminster Abbey was unique in that it was the care and property of the whole empire as well as its glory, rather than the property of any cnechurch. It did not belong to the bishopric of London nor did it draw any revenues other than a comparatively small amount given as maintenance by the British government. The only way to ensure restoration was by public conscription.
