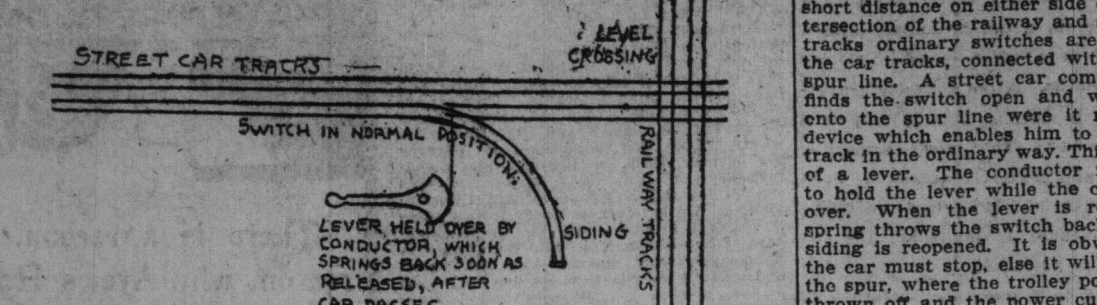

WILL HELP RELIEF MEN.

Street Railway Will Introduce Method to Benefit Employees.

The street railway employees are somewhat excited over a proposed change in the running hours of the relief men. There has always existed considerable dissatisfaction among the relief men on account of the long period of the day, sometimes extending to fourteen and sixteen hours, during which they are required to be ready for duty, in order to get in six or eight hours' time. In order to remedy this grievance the company has had an official visiting different cities of the United States and inspecting the systems in use among other street railway concerns. The result of this official report will be in the system to be put in operation on the cars running from the Dundas-street barns on Monday next. It is stated that more cars will be placed on these routes and that none of the regular men will suffer by the change, which will give the relief men eight or nine hours' steady work daily. The latter, of course, welcome the experiment.
