## \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* QUEEN AND PEACEMAKER.

The Marquise de Fontenoy in The New York Tribune says: "When the secret history of the recent crisis in the relations between Russia and Great Britain comes to be written it will be found that Queen Alexandra played an important role in effecting a peaceful settlement of the affair. The prime minister, altho so far from well that he is now confined to his house, visited the Queen several times during the first two or three days following the attack by the Russian Baltic squadron upon the fleet of Hull fishing boats in the North Sea. The Queen is on the most affectionate terms and in constant communication with the czarina dowager, and the latter's influence with Emperor Nicholas is a matter of common knowledge. On several occasions previously the Queen has been, thru her sister, the medium of important communications to the czar, things which it was a matter of much moment that he should know, and which it was probable that his ministers would either withhold from him or else communicate in an imperfect manner, and it is generally understood in court and official circles in England that it was the action of the Queen in imparting, thru the widowed empress, to the czar the true state of feeling in Great Britain, as well as the horror inspired by the unprovoked nature of the attack upon the defence-less fishermen, which led Nicholas to send that personal message of deep regret, of sympathy for the fishermen and of promise of full reparation which virtually averted war and caused the English people to appreciate the fact that the firing on the fishing fleet was the result of a mistake and not a wilful act of provocation. Queen Alexandra, after her return from Copenhagen, remained at Buckingham Palace, altho the latter is still in the hands of the workmen, for several days, and did not leave town for Sandringham until a peaceful settlement of the trouble was virtually assured." It appears that the Canadian Copper Co. has formed a subsidiary company, called the Huronian Company, which has been developing water power at High Palis on the Spanish River for a year past. The point is four miles north of the C.P.B. station Turbine. The construction works are quite textensive, large concrete dams being employed. The horse power to the extent of 11,000 will be supplied to the company's smelter next year, and the capacity will be increased eventually to 2,000 horse-power. The copper company has a blast furnace in operation in connection with the converters, the new smelter fulls leing in operation with the plant erected during the past year.
