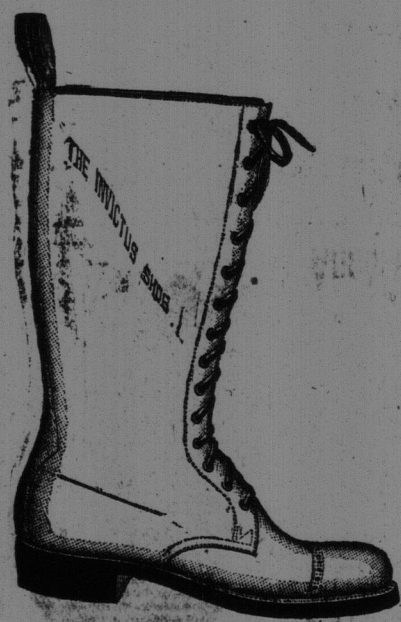

H. H. Reid of Hamilton, Ont., captured Mr. Dixie in the Dunlop & Cooke exhibit on Friday night and brought him to the Dixie cigar booth where he received \$10 and a box of cigars. Dixie was conversing with Reid, who was employed at Bird's exhibit in the main building and becoming suspicious Reid followed Dixie to the Dunlop & Cooke booth and seized him.

Frank J. Gould arrived in the harbor on Saturday in his magnificent steam yacht Heleneetta for his second visit to the city within three weeks. On Sunday afternoon he entertained a party of guests on board, and later was shown over the Governor's Colony by Capt. Thompson. Mr. Gould leaves today for the northern part of the province on a hunt for big game.

The members of the Temple of Honor and Temperance marched to the Brussels street Baptist church yesterday afternoon from the Douglas avenue Christian church, where the parade was formed, and on the return, to the Temperance hall, in the Market building, where the disbandment took place. St. J. band led the parade. In the church Rev. A. B. Cohee, the pastor, delivered an eloquent sermon on the evils of intemperance.

Washed his hands in the fountain Stephen Nickerson's Matutinal Ablutions Led to a Fine of \$8 or 30 days.

4 o'clock this morning in the act of washing his hands in the fountain fountain being unable to satisfactorily account for his appearance on the square at that hour was fined \$8 or thirty days. He said he arrived here stranded from the west on Saturday with the expectation of securing passage on the steamship to Boston, although he had money in a Boston bank he was chary about distributing it.

Wellington Bacon, driver of an ice team for the St. John Ice Company, was arrested at 8.30 this morning on Coburg street for cursing and sneering at Foreman Johnson, of the ice company. Both men were engaged in punning each other when separated by Policeman Bowes and as Bacon refused to comply with the mandate to desist from using profanity he was locked up and a brief sojourn in a cell apparently cooled his ardor.

Frank Cavanaugh, a youthful drunk, was remanded as little credence was placed in his explanation of the source of his supply of liquor. It was a repetition of the conventional "Got it out of a bottle from a stranger, yer Honor." Cavanaugh is reported to be seventeen years old and gave the age of nineteen when arrested on Saturday evening in company with three negroes on King Square, one of the Ethiopians being of sufficient age to be Cavanaugh's grandfather.

George Gibson was fined \$4 or ten days for drunkenness.

SYDNEY SMITH R. Duncan Smith received a telegram this morning from King Square, St. John, N. S., telling of the death at that place last night of his father. Mr. Smith, who was a leading resident of Albionville Harbor, was 78 years of age, and had been ill for two or three years. He leaves a widow, five sons and one daughter. His sons are J. Willard and R. Duncan, of this city; George, of Bridgetown, Conn.; Fred, of New York, and Percy, at home. As a daughter, Stewart Maxwell, of Quincy, Mass., is loved, and his bereaved family will receive the sympathy of all.

EXHIBITORS WERE KEPT BUSY TODAY

Work of Dismantling the Displays in the Big Exhibition Buildings Going on Rapidly—A Fine Collection.

With the closing of the exhibition on Saturday-night exhibitors started dismantling their booths and today there was a steady stream of teams carrying away the goods that were on display there all last week.

The officers of the association were kept busy paying out prize money and awarding diplomas and paying off members of the staff. One of the highest officials just now is William Taylor, the superintendent of grounds and buildings. Mr. Taylor has been setting in this capacity for some years and to him is due a large part of the credit for making the fair such a success. With a number of men he kept busy for several weeks before the show opened getting the buildings and grounds cleaned, having the necessary painting and whitewashing done, getting the decorations placed and generally supervising the work of making the big buildings as attractive as possible. Considerable work remains to be done but with the experience of other years to help him, it is all well to say that all will be satisfactorily looked after.

Among the many interesting exhibits in the women's department was a case containing an assortment of souvenir spoons, collected in various parts of the world, but it is doubtful if many people saw it as it was placed upon the wall of the tea room. The collection was made by Harry N. Dearborn, while visiting in the countries represented and is of considerable value. Each spoon is emblematic of the country it came from and some very fine enamel work and gems enter into their construction. It would be practically impossible to secure such a collection without personally visiting the countries represented. Mr. Dearborn was awarded a diploma by the management of the exhibition for the display.

WANTED GUARANTEE OR THE MONEY BACK

Because the exhibition visitors thought that they were being "done" by a Dock street second-hand dealer they called Patrolmen Kavanaugh and Xera into the store Saturday at the noon hour to straighten matters out. The trouble centered round the purchase of a gold band ring which they stated was offered to them for \$2 with a written guarantee. They asserted to the officers that when they demanded the document the dealer informed them that it would cost a half-dollar more. They then demanded the return of their money, and as they, three in number, asserted that the guarantee was to be forthcoming with the \$2 purchase money, the bluecoats requested the coin be returned to them.

COL. LAMB IN THE CITY

Col. Lamb of the Salvation Army headquarters staff in London, England, who is in charge of the Army's immigration business, accompanied by Col. Howell, head of the Canadian immigration department, was in the city Saturday. Col. Lamb has been touring Canada to ascertain the conditions of the Army's settlers so that a basis might be formed for an immigration policy as regards Canada for next year. Plans for next year were progressing, but there was nothing definite to report. While here, Col. Lamb and Col. Howell had a conference with Commissioner Coombs. The two officers had been through to the coast and were on their way to Halifax where the tour will be completed.
