Charlottetown a few days ago with the  
intention of buying the well known stall-  
ion Oakley Baron, has returned home  
without him. He says the horse is a  
beauty, one of the finest he ever drove  
behind, and that his stock are the finest  
ever raised in Prince Edward Island, all  
being large, very handsome and showing  
signs of early and extreme speed. Oakley  
Baron is well thought of by the farmers  
of Prince Edward Island, and his owner,  
Mr. McKie, is not anxious to sell him  
just now.Local retail fish merchants report that  
the past Lent was a very profitable one  
both to dealers and fishermen, as the wea-  
ther was better adapted for fishing than  
many previous seasons. The lobster sea-  
son was quite good. It closes on June  
15, and large-sized crustaceans are ex-  
pected to be on the market from next week  
until the conclusion of the period. St.  
John gasperaux, which are known as  
olives over the border, are now on  
sale in Bangor at six cents each, while  
two cents is the price asked by the local  
retailers, and it is expected that they will  
further decrease in price shortly.At the present rate the excavations at

WITH THE PREMIERCity School Teachers Met Mr.  
Hazen Yesterday and Discuss-  
ed the Pension BillA number of city school teachers had  
a conference with Premier Hazen here  
yesterday with reference to the pension  
scheme and while none would consent to  
be quoted, it is understood that the re-  
sult was not satisfactory.A delegation from the city teachers will  
go to Fredericton Saturday to interview  
the executive. Opinion is, however, that  
the matter will be shelved.There are considerable differences in  
what the teachers asked and what the  
government bill proposes; the age limit  
is the same—forty-five for females and  
sixty for males. The teachers asked to  
have the period of service after which the  
pension could be claimed, fixed at thirty  
years. The government has changed this  
to thirty-five. The teachers wanted a flat  
rate of \$250 for females and \$400 for males.The government measure makes this half  
of the average salary for the last five  
years in the profession, but not to exceed  
\$400. Under such a plan, it was pointed  
out, the city teachers would be much bet-  
ter off than the county teachers. The  
complete dropping of the disability clause  
is another grievance. Previous to the  
election Premier Hazen promised to in-  
troduce the bill as a government measure.At a meeting of the High School teach-  
ers here on Saturday, a resolution was  
passed asking the department of educa-  
tion to extend Labor day in the summer  
holidays. The feeling was that it was  
scarcely worth while to open the schools  
only to close them a week later.The Grand Division of the Brotherhood
