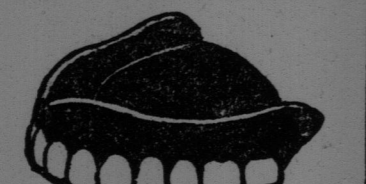

LABARRE'S MINSTRELS

Clever Refined Entertainment at the Opera House Last Night.

The very large audience which greeted La Barre Bros' minstrels in the Opera House last evening afforded convincing evidence that despite the popular preference for other lines of amusement a really good minstrel troupe can still get the money.

La Barre Bros' troupe is not a very large one and does not rely on elaborate staging for its effects, but does put up a first-class article of clean, refined minstrelsy and as such is deserving of good patronage.

The performance opened with the circle which was unusual in its quality. The songs, some of which were new were well rendered and the four comedians kept the audience in hearty laughter. The jokes were well told and were refreshingly free from suggestiveness or vulgarity.

In the old time number was Alexander, hand balancer and equilibrist who contributed an excellent turn. TEMPERANCE CAUSE GAINING IN QUEBEC

Representative Men Address 7,000 People at Anti-Alcoholic League Meeting.

QUEBEC, Sept. 26.—Six to seven thousand people attended the public gathering of the Anti-Alcoholic League of Quebec held Wednesday night in the drill hall, when addresses were delivered by a number of prominent Quebecers. The temperance wave is decidedly strong in Quebec at present and played a considerable part in the election of several of the city aldermen at the last municipal elections.

Chief Justice Sir Francis Langelle presided, supported by the Lieutenant Governor, Archbishop Bruchesi, Mgrs. Enard, LaBrosse, Blais, MacDonald and Blanche, Mayor Garneau, Hon. Roy, provincial secretary, Senator Choquette, Hon. L. P. Pelletier, Hon. Thos. Chapias and others.

Most of the above addressed the meeting, and expressed sympathy with the object of the league.

Sir F. Langelle, in the course of his remarks, said that the amount of money spent on alcoholic beverages in this province was fourteen times as much as the whole province's revenue, and he pictured what good might be accomplished if this money were devoted to the cause of education, or that of colonization. Mgr. Bruchesi, who followed Sir Louis Jetté and Mgr. Begin, aroused the enthusiasm of the audience by strongly condemning the drinking habit and the use of liquor at banquets, and appealing to parents and teachers properly to influence the rising generation in this direction. He appealed to those in authority to put an end to the liquor traffic, and drew attention to the moral and hygienic danger to the number of taverns and the number of bakeries in Montreal.

ASSOCIATED CHARITIES

Mrs. Hall, secretary of the Associated Charities, reports that the season just past has been probably the most successful in the history of the organization. Preparations are being made for the annual meeting to be held in October, but the date has not yet been determined.

Mrs. Hall says that the association has had a number of difficult cases to deal with, but in practically every instance these have been successfully handled.

There is more than one case of illness or death in the family.

Mrs. Hall adds that although it has cost more to live during the past summer, there has been plenty of work, especially for men, and she has not had more than half a dozen male applicants for employment. Owing to the fact that so many people spent the summer months in the country, there was not very much work for women during July and August, but these are always "off months," and now that people are returning to the city there is and will be plenty of employment in the way of home cleaning.

At the secretary's suggestion a new and up-to-date method will be employed by the association in keeping their records. Books have hitherto been used for this purpose, and very often it took a great deal of time to hunt up the records of families with whom the association has had dealings. In future, however, the card system will be employed, thus making it possible to secure all necessary information at a moment's notice.

Mrs. Hall is more than satisfied with Mrs. Robertson, her assistant, and says that thus far her work has been all that could be desired. Since her appointment the number of district visitors has been lessened and she and Miss Robertson take entire charge of investigations.

The funeral of the late Miss Sarah A. McCookery took place from the New Victoria Hotel at 9:30 o'clock this morning, to St. John the Baptist church, where high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev.
