To All Whom It May Concern: Notice is hereby given that authority has been granted by order of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council of the Province of New Brunswick, to the Council of the City of Saint John, to prepare a Town-Planning Scheme, in accordance with the Provisions of the Act of Assembly 2, George 5, Cap. 19, Intituled "An Act Relating to Town-Planning". A copy of the Order in Council giving such authority, and a Map showing the Area for which authority to prepare a Town-Planning Scheme has been given, may be inspected by any person interested, without payment of any fee, at the Office of the Common Clerk of the City of Saint John, between the hours of ten and twelve in the forenoon of any weekday, and between the hours of two and five in the afternoon of any weekday except Saturday; and provision has been made for furnishing any necessary information or explanation with reference thereto.

All owners of Land within the area for which authority has been granted as above, are requested to send their names stating the location and extent of property held, to Mr. A. H. Wetmore, Secretary of the Saint John City Town-Planning Commission.

THE GROCERY MARKET

(Canadian Grocer)

Office of publication, Toronto, July 11, 1916.—Trends of the week from the trade's point of view and also that of the public, since they have to help pay, have been a series of minor advances. The situation in beans does not improve any in fact it gets worse instead of better. Further advances took place this week. Right through from St. John to the farthest west of the continent, reports at least a firmness and in most cases actually an advance in the price of beans. Next crop will be late, it is learned, and with this crop as scarce as it is one wonders what prices will be like by October, when the new stuff, which should be harvested, will be missing.

Cheese levels declined a couple of cents this week. Calumet report Liverpool and London as decidedly easier, while domestic markets are easing off. Eggs, while still appreciably lower, are on the easier side. Western eggs are being shipped to eastern markets in quantities, and this coupled with the fact that demand for storage has let up largely in working towards lower levels. Hot weather has doubtless had something to do with it. Again and again hot weather has slackened demand from consumer, which, by the by, has been unusually large this year.

Canned vegetables still hold very firm, and every week brings us nearer to higher levels for peas and tomatoes, the latter notably. Tomato crop areas show the same thing everywhere, namely, that early rains did incalculable damage, damage which, unlike that in some other lines, cannot be repaired at once. Then the higher and ever higher price of cans and tins, the labor scarcity, and the export demand have all been added factors of importance. So that, by every sign and token, we shall see high prices for tomatoes in cans this year. Corn and peas will also be higher than usual, with more or less the same contributory reasons.

THE MARKETS AT A GLANCE

(Hardware and Metal) July 18
Although the upward tendency of prices is less pronounced than it was a few weeks ago, some important changes have taken place during the week. Among the lines affected in an upward direction are boiler tubes, black and smokeless loaded shells, American metallic cartridges, empty shells, wads, primers, caps, American firearms, padlocks and night lights, wire clothes line, wire rope, asbestos hulling machines, raw and boiled linseed oil, turpentine. The weakness in ingot metals continues and price declines have occurred on tin, copper, spelter, antimony, lead. Sheet zinc and solder have both declined in price. Paint manufacturers are experiencing great difficulty in securing supplies of dry colors. Some colors are practically off the market, while others are available only at ridiculously high costs. Reports from Western Canada wholesale hardware firms indicate that there has been decidedly marked im-

Germany's Fading Credit

When the present war broke out, many of the predictions were made about its probable economic consequences. Now that the contest has lasted well into its second year, it is possible to judge not only of these predictions, but of the actual economic position. All the belligerent have been forced to alter their economic life in the direction of concentrating industry upon the one work of producing munitions of war. Financial difficulties at home have been successfully avoided in practically all the countries now at war, so that it is only in neutral countries that a just estimate of the respective credit of the belligerents can be formed. In recording the neutral estimates of German and British credit, the country in which the competition seems to be fiercest is Holland, which is separated only by a land frontier from Germany, and by a comparatively short sea passage from England.
