



PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that a bill will be presented for enacment at the next session of the Legislature intituled "An Act in further amendment of 'The Saint John City Assessment Act 1909' and to amend the laws relating to civic franchise."

The object of the bill is:—

1. to exempt all incomes from personal labor and occupation up to and including \$1000 per annum; also to exempt \$500 of each such income above \$1000, and not exceeding \$2000.

2. to impose a poll tax of \$2.00 and no more upon all persons whose incomes are totally exempt from taxation.

3. to exempt all household furniture from taxation where the value does not exceed \$500.


4. to provide that the last day in which the Common Council shall have power to determine and direct what assessments shall be levied in the City of Saint John shall be the 30th instead of the 15th day of January in each year.

5. to provide that the poll tax of \$2.00 shall give the same right to vote at civic elections which the \$500 poll tax now does.
