## MAY 24 TIME OF DANGER FOR WOODS

Forestry Officials Prepare for Emergencies from Forest Fires.

As a result of the dry period preceding the Victoria day holiday on May 24th, when thousands of the residents of the province will answer to the call of the woods and streams, forestry officials are preparing for emergencies which may arise from forest fires. Victoria Day has always been regarded as one of the most dangerous periods of the fire season.

Already approximately fifty municipal fire wardens, appointed as deputies by county councillors, have been confirmed in their appointments as such by the Department of Lands and Mines, while additional municipal fire wardens are also being appointed in the parish districts remote from the direct supervision of the county councillors representing these districts. The municipal fire warden is vested with the same power in respect to the control of forest fires as held by the county councillors at present York and Kings counties have led in the number of the appointments which have been made.

Seventy licensees of crown lands have also joined in the general scheme for the preservation of the forests from destruction by fire, in the appointment of 280 co-operative fire wardens. School teachers and school children of the more advanced grades in schools adjacent to forest lands have also responded to the general call of protection.

The Department of Lands and Mines, and have undertaken the placing of notices calling the attention of the tourist and sportsman to the danger of carelessness in setting fires.

Since the inauguration of the new system of registration for forest travel has been announced, this new step towards conservation has received the hearty endorsement of the public. Many residents have taken the time to express their approval of the new measure and the promise of their cooperation in carrying it out. Thousands of certificates have already been issued while stores handling sporting goods have requested the authority to issue these certificates also as a matter of convenience to their patrons. This authority is being granted to the applicants.

**ATTEMPTED SUICIDE  
TO ESCAPE SCHOOL**

**Sarnia Girl Accused of  
Truancy Drank Carbolic  
Acid.**

Sarnia, May 23.—Melen Western, motherless daughter of William J. Western, residing in St. John's, attempted to take her life when she drank from a bottle containing carbolic acid. She lies in a serious condition at Sarnia General Hospital. The girl is a fourteen-year-old high school pupil, and is charged with truancy. It is believed to have been the cause of her action.

She left a note, addressed to her father, in which she said she did not want to continue at school. It is also said that she had not been a regular attendant at the Sarnia Collegiate Institute, where she was a first-year student, and that she had stayed at home unknown to her father, who left early on Monday morning for the Michigan Metal Company. The school authorities are said to have taken up the matter of her absence with the parent, and this is believed to have influenced the girl to take poison.

She is described as a bright girl, distinctly clever, and was usually of a despondent nature. Inquiries at the hospital elicited the information that her condition is quite serious, although for the time being no fatal result is expected.

**WAS FAMOUS HEADMASTER**  
Rev. Dr. James Gow Left \$32,394 Estate.
