COAL OPERATORS REJECT FINDINGS OF


KNOWLES BOARD Calgary, Alta., June 25-The recom nendation of the majority report of the Knowles conciliation board of a thirty per cent decrease in wages in District 18, United Mine Workers of America, was rejected at a meeting of the West-ern Canada Coal Operators' Association here Saturday and the department of labor at Ottawa was notified accord-ingly.
