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Q.390 Now do you recall visiting him that day?
A.390 Yes sir.

Q.391 What was his condition?
A.391 Just as I wrote it down - the flu and the scabies were bothering again.

Q.392 Is there anything further about him on that date?
A.392 Not on that day, sir.

Q.393 Now, on that particular day, having refreshed your memory, do you recall what you told him to do?
A.393 I saw him again on the following day, on the Twenty-Seventh and ordered him to stay in bed.

Q.394 Will you turn over to the Twenty-Seventh and see if there is any reference in there to Captain Jessop?
A.394 Visited Leer today. Jessop in bed today. Doesn't appear very ill. Things are as usual quiet in unit. I guess Jessop better stay in bed for week. Maybe got jaundice. His appetite is no hell. Supposed to come with me to the Hague this weekend.

Q.395 You did on that day, order him to stay in bed for the week?
A.395 Yes sir.

Q.396 And what was the next time you saw Jessop?
A.396 On the Twenty-Eighth.

Q.397 What did you tell him on the Twenty-Eighth?
A.397 The entry I have here is: Jessop better. Will not come with me to the Hague on the weekend.

Q.398 He's better is he?
A.398 That's the entry I have here.

Q.399 And that date is what?
A.399 The Twenty-Eighth.

Q.400 Now, when did you see him again?
A.400 I didn't until the following weekend. I went away on the - after the Twenty-Eighth.

Q.401 I see. Now, on the Twenty-Sixth and on the Twenty-Seventh - excuse me - on the Twenty-Eighth when you made the note that he was better, do you recall whether he got up or you told him to get up?
A.401 He was lying around in his pyjamas. I told him to stay in bed for the remainder of the week.

Q.402 But when you say he was better, what do you mean by that?
A.402 I was no longer worried about any complications. I wrote him off as a medical case.

Q.403 What do you mean you wrote him off as a medical case?
A.403 I considered him better. He didn't need medical treatment.

Q.404 That was on the Twenty-Eighth?
A.404 Yes sir.

Q.405 Was he in any condition at that time, do you recall, to get up and go out?
A.405 He wasn't in any extreme state.

Q.406 On the Twenty-Seventh you ordered the man to bed. I'm trying to get this from you Captain Fassina, was your advice to him to get up on the Twenty-Eighth or was it to carry on the treatment for the week?

JA: You are too leading. This is your witness.

Witness: Well, on the Twenty-Seventh, I ordered the man to bed. He got some pills. Surely any man will go to bed without being told.
