61. Q.—It might be five, six or seven? A.—It would be a pure guess if I said it, as I do not know.

62. Q.—What time are you speaking about? A.—I am speaking about the time when you were in the iron moulders' union before he became foreman? A.—I am not sure.

63. Q.—Did he remain in the iron moulders' union before he became foreman? A.—I do not know.

64. Q.—Have you ever heard of A.—I never heard of the matter spoken of.

65. Q.—And you have not? A.—Beyond surprise, no.

66. Q.—And what would your estimate be? A.—That he would no longer be a member of the union.

67. Q.—But you do not think that you have any knowledge or info at all? A.—Nothing definite in relation to this matter.

68. Q.—No matter whether it has relation to the matter or not—let me know what you know? A.—I do not understand your question.

69. Q.—In your opinion, did you know the man who became foreman? A.—I do not know.

70. Q.—What was the name of the man who became foreman? A.—I do not know.

71. Q.—You are quite positive about that? A.—Yes.

72. Q.—And if any advice was given it would not be in the nature of a threat, if they did not mind the union? A.—No, not with the authority of the company.

73. Q.—Will some foreman perhaps might have entreated the rules established by the general manager of the company on this subject? A.—Very doubtful.

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
