## WILL NOT SUSPEND THE CONSTITUTION

MR. J. CHAMBERLAIN'S REPLY TO PETITION

Government Satisfied Cape Parliament Will Take Steps to Provide for Security of Country.

Colonial Secretary, Joseph Chamberlain, to the petition for the suspension of the constitution of Cape Colony, was published in a parliamentary paper this evening. It says there is no precedent for the suspension of the constitution of a self-governing colony. The suson could be effected only by an act of the Imperial parliament. The govnt believes such a step is not called for, unless it is proven that the constitution is a positive danger to the colony's peace, or that a great majority of the whites desire that the authority be completely transferred to the Imperial government. Such a desire could only be constitutionally expressed by a tion of the Cape parliament. It will be necessary to pass an act of indemnity, on account of violations of the constitution, and it may also perhaps be needful to confer special powers on the Cape government for carrying out the pacification of the colony and the maintenance of British interests.
