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



For Life. For Life. St. Petersburg, via Eidtkuhnen, Feb. 18.—Another "slaughter of the inno-cents" has been perpetrated by the Rus-sian police. This time the outrage oc-curred in Mobileff, in the government of Minsk, and among the vietims, mostly Jews, were several young women, who were kicked, stabbed and beaten. The massacre took place on Wedness-day, but until Thursday the efforts of the authorities to keep it quiet were 6,315 Tons-The White Bear. Rossland, B. Nelson, Feb. 15 .- The first drowning accident of the year at, or near this city occurred this afternoon shortly after 1 o'clock, when James J. Brookling, a day. resident of Nelson for the past year and a former South African yolunteer, was drowned while crossing over the frozen surface of Kootenay lake, a mile or s east of the city. Brookling, who was a laborer, was crossing over with G. N. Gilchrist on his way to look for work. About midway the ice broke and both men were precipitated into the water.
