Seeing that all was lost he fied from the Capital and took ship for France. Madero became President and began a regime of pardon and concilliation hoping thereby to settle the distracted state of the country. The feroclous Zapata brothers, however, still kept up the war in the Southern Provincus, and attempts were made by Diaz sympathizers to rekindle the flames of war in the North.
