A PLATFORM CARRIED OUT. The Fredericton Farmer, (Conservative) vidently believes that Attorney-General Blair has carried out the platform proposed in opposition. It says, editorially: -"One f the main reasons, no doubt, which prompted this action on the part of the gov rnment, is their desire to unload the country of the legislative council, and effect a saving of some \$10,000, an amount more than sufficient for the entire cost of the election. Mr. Blair has thus taken the carliest opportunity of giving effect to the abolition ill, passed through his efforts, and hereafter the province will be governed by one legislative chamber. The country will undoubtedly give the government the full measure of credit they deserve, in having uccessfully carried out the greatest reform ever attempted in New Brunswick. Mr. Blair was intrusted with the government, in 1883, on the strength of his promise to effect several important reforms in the public ser vice, and he has faithfully fulfilled his contract. platform, as moved in the assembly in 1882, he promised "(1) To abolish the office of private secretary to the governor. He has done so. (2) to reduce the number of the executive council from 9 to 7.
