DELICIOUS LAYER CAKES.
Of good homemade cakes those made in layers fill a need for an evening collation or company desert. The recipe given are unusual and therefore of special value. Dedicate Coffee Cakes—Few people are familiar with coffee as a flavoring for layer cakes, yet it makes one of the most delicious known. For the layers, cream one-half pound of butter and one pound of sugar. Add a cup of milk. Beat the mixture with a whisk until it is light and fluffy. Add one egg, one-half cup of flour, and one-half cup of cocoa powder. Bake in round jelly cake pans. To make the filling, mix two large tablespoons of well ground Mocha and Java coffee in a piece of cheesecloth, put the bag in the pot and pour over it three quarters of a cupful of boiling water. Cover closely and let simmer slowly for ten minutes. Remove from the fire and let the coffee cool. Reserve one tablespoonful for icing. Reserve one tablespoonful for a double boiler and add a pinch of salt and three-quarters of a cup of milk. Thicken with two tablespoons of four rubberized paste with a little milk and allow the mixture to cook for two minutes; then pour over the coffee and spread between the layers. To make the icing, stir one-quarter of a pound of confectioner's sugar, a pinch of salt and three-quarters of a cup of milk. NEW WAR MATERIAL.
Military Motor Wagons Are Now Being Used.
Important trials of motor wagons for military use are being carried on constantly in various armies. The most interesting of these are those conducted by an army board at Feldever, near Vienna, Austria, and the British trials at Aldershot, the results of which have just been published in a report. In the Austrian trials, the wagons were ten and 12 horse power Daimler and Benz models, and the maximum load was 11,000 pounds. The wagons were used during 240 days, for a total time of 624 hours, making from one to four trips a day. The total distance covered was 3,080 miles, or 12.4 miles a day, and the road varied, being sometimes a good highway, sometimes country roads and sometimes natural roads. The average amount transported was 9,000 pounds per day at a rate of five miles per hour. It was found that in deep snow and cold weather the maximum load of the motor wagon was found to be made up of many parts, especially of the motor, the driving apparatus, the ignition burners, the wheels and the pipes of the fuel and water systems. The motor was to be entirely replaced, as was the magnet-electric igniter and the driving wheels.

THE RATE OF TRAVEL.
The motor wagons were also tested in pulling heavy loads, and in coast runs and the results were entirely satisfactory. The maximum load was 11,000 pounds, and the maximum speed was 10.8 miles per hour. The results of the trials were most satisfactory, and it is believed that the motor wagon will be used extensively in the future.
