LONDON, June 10.—Vice-Admiral Sir Harry Dawson, governor of New South Wales, has cabled Mr. Chamberlain, in behalf of the government of New South Wales, strongly supporting the colonial secretary's preferential trade proposals. The governor's message concludes:

"Realizing that what is Canada's turn today may be Australia's tomorrow, my government expresses great satisfaction at the declaration by the British government that every self-governing colony shall be secured the free exercise of its rights to enter into closer trade relations with the mother country."
