WILHELMINA'S TOAST. ARTIST GOES INSANE
AT A ROYAL CONCERT

An Evidence of Amity Between
Britain and Holland.

Queen of the Netherlands Refers to King
Edward in Most Flattering Terms
—Always Among First to
Alleviate Suffering.

The toast of the Queen of the Netherlands to King Edward and Queen Alexandra at a recent dinner at The Hague in honor of Prince Alexander of Teck, has been the cause of much favorable comment in the British press. Prince Alexander has been sent to Holland to confer the Grand Cross of the Bath on the Prince Consort in recognition of his prompt and courageous efforts to save the survivors on the wrecked steamer Berlin.

Speaking in English, Her Majesty said: "I have much pleasure in welcoming Prince Alexander of Teck, to whom it has pleased His Majesty the King of Great Britain and Ireland to entrust the mission of bringing the Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath to the Prince Consort. I am deeply sensible of the honor so graciously conferred on the Prince by His Majesty, who is always among the first to acknowledge and attempt to alleviate suffering or to rescue from danger or distress. May this occasion prove a fresh link of sympathy between our two Houses, and knit in even closer bonds of friendship our countries, which are already united by so many ties in the past and present. I drink to the health of their Majesties the King and Queen of Great Britain and Ireland, and to that of the Royal Family."

Referring to the incident, The Times says: "The ties which unite the British and the Dutch are, in the past and strong. We have fought against each other, and we have fought shoulder to shoulder in many a campaign that has made history against common foes of the two countries who were also in bygone times the foes of the liberties of Europe. To no nation do we owe more in the defence and the development of our own domestic freedom than to the Dutch. We know our Dutch neighbors, and they know us, since days long before some of the most powerful of modern continental States were heard of, and the knowledge has taught us respect for the many sterling good qualities which we equally share. A sensible understanding of our real interests is amongst these qualities, and that, we need hardly say, points strongly to the maintenance of intimate and friendly relations between us."

The war with the South Africa Republics estranged for a time the people of Holland from their best, their oldest and their surest friends. The leaders of their kindred in that heroic struggle are today the responsible Ministers of King Edward in the Transvaal, and will doubtless soon hold the same office in the Orange River Colony. We accept the toast of Queen Wilhelmina as a token that the misunderstandings which the war caused in Holland and which even to the worst days of the contest were never resented by the people of England have forever passed away. We hail the event as of good augury for the peace of Europe."

HABEAS CORPUS WRIT
FOR NEW-BORN BABY

Playwright, in Matrimonial Distress, Sues
for Right to Admire Progeny.

NEW YORK, March 25.—Lee Arthur, whose real name is Arthur Lee Kahn, and who makes a living writing plays, is to be allowed to see his infant child every day, if he so desires, under the writ of the supreme court made today.

Kahn and his wife have not been on the most intimate terms lately, and it was somewhat of a shock the other day when he learned that she had given birth to a bouncing boy and had given him to her father, the father, see it. He got out a habeas corpus writ for the baby.

The mother's lawyers interposed that Baby Kahn was far too young to be brought to court, but it was promised and agreed that if its playwright father would stop the machinery of the law, Mrs. Kahn would allow him to examine and admire baby every day. And so the matter was settled.

HELLERTOWN, Pa., March 22.—Citizens are stoutly protesting at the action of town council in electing Charles Zimpher, chief of police, street supervisor, lamplighter and water works plumber, besides being janitor of the fire engine house.

Zimpher was defeated for health secretary, and when he offered to resign last night as chief of police, the town council refused to accept his resignation and increased his salary from \$40 to \$50 a month.

Citizens are also criticizing several councilmen for furnishing material to the borough.

COULD NOT BE SERVED WITH
SUMMONS IN CIVIL SUIT

NEW YORK, March 25.—Justice Newburger, in the supreme court today upheld the contention of Henry McKee of Harry Thaw's counsel, that Thomas McCall, while under subpoena by District Attorney Jerome to testify in the Thaw trial could not be served with a summons in a civil suit. McCall, who was one of Harry Thaw's party on the night Stanford White was shot, was permitted by District Attorney Jerome to return to his home in California on February 21, but in the meantime the summons had been served.

HAVE FAST STEAMSHIP
LINE SAYS CLOUSTON

MONTREAL, Q., March 25.—E. S. Clouston, general manager of the Bank of Montreal, returned to Montreal after two months' sojourn abroad. Mr. Clouston returned via Halifax and expressed the opinion that it was a great pity that Canada had not a faster steamship service with Great Britain. "The Victoria, on which we came over, is a very good boat," he said, "and the trip from Halifax via the I. C. R. was quite comfortable and occupied less than twenty-four hours, but Canada should have a fast steamship line with Great Britain."

Mr. Clouston spent only a short time in London, but could say that the recent trip of Lord Strathcona to Canada, had done a great amount of good.
