MEMORIAL SERVICE

TO LATE KING CARLOS

LISBON, April 23.—A memorial service for the late King Carlos and the Crown Prince of Portugal, who were assassinated February 1 last, will be held on April 25, at Jeronymos Convent and will be attended by King Manuel and Dowager Queen Amelie. This will be the king's first public appearance on the streets and the greatest precautions have been taken for his safety. Troops will line the route followed by His Majesty to and from the convent.
