WOULDN'T WIN

ON A QUIBBLE

Foster's Suit Invalidated by Technical Error

But Editor McDonald Refused to Take the Advantage—Investigation Renewed.

TORONTO, Feb. 18.—Justice Magee this morning in the slander and libel suit of Hon. Geo. E. Foster against Dr. J. A. McDonald, editor of the Globe, ruled out the slander charge and ordered that the libel charge be proceeded with. He stated that Dr. McDonald in his defense taken objection to the failure of Hon. Mr. Foster to give notice in writing of his intention to proceed with the suit, that he would have ruled the whole suit out.

The feature of the session was the many objections raised by Foster's counsel to the admission of documents and occasionally to questions asked by Mr. Rowell. They were noted by the judges.

Col. Elliot M. Stevenson, Supreme High Chief Ranger of the Independent Order of Foresters, was the first witness called. He was asked to identify letters from Mr. Foster, minutes of the Union Trust Company and many other documents which have already figured in the insurance inquiry and in statements of claim and defense in the present suit. After the bulk of the documents had been handed in Mr. Rowell was proceeding to refer to other hand deals in which it is alleged Foster was engaged, when Mr. Hallmuth protested, but after somewhat lengthy argument Justice Magee ruled that the evidence was admissible.

Col. Stevenson said the Union Trust Company was incorporated in 1901. Foster had a small amount of stock, \$1,000. Wilson had a small amount originally, I think \$400, which was subsequently reduced, I think, to \$1,000. Col. Davidson had a similar amount, \$1,000. Judge McDougall originally had \$1,000, which subsequently passed, I think, to Chancellor Boyd. Then who took \$25,000 of Wilson stock? (A)—The Foresters.

So the position was that of \$25,000 worth of stock, \$1,980,000 were held by the Foresters and \$4,000 by four parties mentioned.

With the stock was issued eventually there were only four or five stockholders in Quebec lands, and these held \$1,000 each, at par.

Details of various land purchases by the Union Trust were then gone into at length. Witness said he had refused to allow directors of Trust Company to borrow its money and form a syndicate for the purpose of personal investment in Quebec lands.

"Did you communicate your views to Foster?"

"Yes, I told him no outsider had a right to join the Foresters in a matter of this kind. He combatted me and said if others were willing to dissolve the syndicate he would join them. The matter came up time and again, and then Mr. Foster reluctantly agreed to dissolve the syndicate, but Oronchatscha, Col. McNeill, Montague and Foster were not to receive any profits. The matter was to be treated as an investment by the Trust Company."

TOWER OF LONDON.

The Perfect System by Which Its Towers are Guarded.

The Tower of London has the most perfect system of burglar alarms that has yet been devised.

From Scotland Yard, from the garrison headquarters and from other places known only to a few responsible officials the tower can be closed electrically within a few seconds. Even the ponderous gates at the middle tower, which weigh some 100 tons and through which visitors pass, swing too automatically and the escape of every one within is instantly barred.

At the same time an alarm bell rings to warn wardens, police and soldiers. In particular the precautions in the apartment containing the crown jewels are of a most scientifically elaborate kind. One of the beefsteaks on duty in the room has merely to press a button, whereupon the heavy door closes, the alarm bell below rings, the other gates slam to and lock, and every person within the tower is instantly cut off from the outer world.

"The man who can get away with any of the crown jewels deserves them," observed a Tower official. "For where I am standing I could close every important door and gate in the tower in an short a time of it takes to utter these words."

It was mainly to insure the safety of the crown jewels that the system was installed.

No order had been issued for the closing of the Tower on a recent Saturday when, greatly to their alarm, the visitors found doors locked, bolted

and barred against them for about ten minutes, preventing any one leaving the Tower.

"The Tower simply closed—that is all," remarked an official. "Who caused it to do so we do not know. It might have been Scotland Yard, where the pressing of a button would imprison every soul within the Tower until the police gave the signal for their release, or it might have been the governor, anxious to learn whether we were all at our posts. At any rate, it was none of the minor officials."

"In fact, who closed the Tower and why is a secret known only to the highest authorities. There was no alarm, no attempt to seize the crown jewels."—London Mail.
