TEN MILLION ACRES SOWN WITH WHEAT

Continued from page 1. 47,800 acres for barley, or 491,700 acres for the three crops. During June the crops throughout Canada maintained generally the favorable average of a month ago. On June 30th the condition, expressed in percentages of the usual standard of 100, taken as representing the promise of a full crop, was as follows: Fall wheat 81.46; spring wheat 87.80; oats 87.71; barley 88.30; rye 85.95; peas 87.43; mixed grains 87.12; hay and clover, 71.62; alfalfa 77.23, and pasture 82.31.

Making a general railroad strike seem inevitable within a short time, the representatives of the forty-two railroads east of Chicago broke off all further negotiations with the representatives of the conductors and trainmen. The latter sent out a call for the general committee of the Eastern railroads to meet Saturday to vote on the date of the strike to begin. The vote by all the men involved, which was announced, showed that 76,683 had voted for a strike and only 4,210 against a strike.

When Elisha Lee, chairman of the Managers' Committee, refused to consider uniform increases of wages the 150 representatives of the conductors and trainmen's locals withdrew to prepare for a strike.

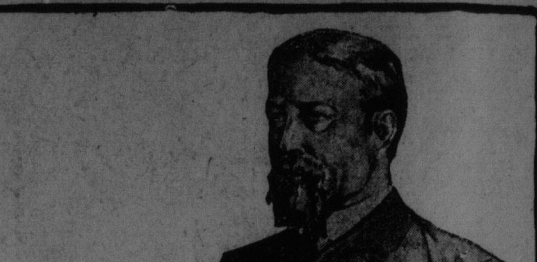

HON. MR. HAZEN'S TRIBUTE TO LATE SENATOR ELLIS

Ottawa, July 12.—Hon. J. D. Hazen, the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, pays a willing tribute to the memory of the late Senator Ellis, as follows: "The news of Senator Ellis' death will be heard with deep regret throughout the Dominion and more particularly in the city and province in which the greater part of his life has been spent. In many respects he was St. John's leading citizen, and was always ready to render public service and to assist and encourage any worthy cause. As a member of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick and of the Parliament of Canada he was most painstaking and industrious and left the impress of his mind upon the enactments of these bodies, for no member took a keener or more intelligent interest in perfecting legislation that came before them. As a member of the Senate he easily occupied a foremost place in the esteem of the country and of his fellow members, by whom his mature judgment, his wide and varied experience, his independence of thought and his great abilities were highly and deservedly appreciated. As a Senator he never allowed party considerations to interfere with his conscientious discharge of his duty, and in this respect he was a striking exception in a body which is in theory independent of all party considerations, but in fact is often a mere arena for party strife. He was a staunch upholder of the Liberal party and rendered it an actual service in St. John and New Brunswick than any other man of his generation. He founded and created the St. John Globe and made it a journalistic power in New Brunswick. Personally, I was associated with him in connection with the work of the University of New Brunswick, and in other ways, and always found him a delightful and interesting companion and sincerely desirous of promoting the public welfare. His death will be deeply deplored, and of him it may be truly said that he was faithful in all things and a large hearted and large minded Christian gentleman."

MANY AT FUNERAL OF LATE THOMAS PATTON

The funeral of the late Thomas Patton took place yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from Trinity church, following burial services which were conducted by Rev. R. A. Armstrong, assisted by Rev. P. Coulburt. The church choir was present and sang several hymns. At the conclusion of the services the body was conveyed to Fernhill, where interment took place. A large number of beautiful floral tributes were received, among which were a large cross from the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of Trinity church, and a large wreath from the members of the Sunday school. The following resolution has been adopted by Trinity church vestry: "The vestry records with deep regret the loss of Thomas Patton, who entered into rest on Friday last. His life was very largely devoted to the work of Trinity church, for sixty-one years he took an active part in the Sunday school, acting as superintendent, treasurer and teacher of the Bible class. In the latter capacity for twenty-seven years. His charming personality attracted and held the minds of the scores of young boys whom it was his privilege to teach, and by whom he is so affectionately remembered. His long service in this way is probably unequalled in the history of the parish. In 1890 he was elected a vestryman and in 1910 a church warden. A regular attendant at the services of the church, always available to assist the rector in any work assigned to him, most deeply interested in all church matters, his singularly pure and simple life has made a permanent imprint upon the parish, proving day by day that the life which he lived in this world, he lived by the power of the Son of God."
