WILL CLOSE MINES

PENDING AGREEMENT

Operators, Representing Eighty-five per cent. of Output will Suspend Business until New Wage Schedule is Signed.

Philadelphia, April 10.—Bituminous coal operators representing eighty-five per cent. of the output of Central Pennsylvania, today decided by a vote of 30 to 2 to close their mines pending the signing of a new wage agreement with their employees. It is expected the operators will order their mines to close tomorrow night.

Efforts to arrange to make a new wage schedule to take the place of one that expired on March 21, have been under way for some weeks. Conferences were recently suspended, but it is expected they will be resumed next week.
