## YOUNG IMMIGRANT SENTENCED TO TWO YEARS IN DORCHESTER

James Gibson, of Gagetown given term in Penitentiary for assault committed on aged woman last fall.

Gagetown, May 20.—The may sittings of the king's bench circuit for Queens county opened at Gagetown yesterday, Judge Crockett presiding. There was no civil case on the docket and the only criminal case was that of the Cosmar farm youth, Gibson, for assault with intent to rape, on which he was committed for trial last fall.

The grand jury found a true bill, both on this count and also on the count for assault with intent to do bodily harm.

The prisoner when arraigned yesterday pleaded not guilty and was defended by Mr. Peter Hughes. Mr. R. H. Hanson conducted the case for the crown.

Prisoner's counsel before trial sought to void the indictment on the ground that Gibson had been previously arraigned upon the charge at a session of the Queens county court intervening and also because the magistrate who held the preliminary examination in the case, Mr. F. Sherman Peters, had refused the motion against the importation of such a class of emigrants when public feeling was aroused over this attempted outrage.

Judge Crockett refused the motion to quash the indictment on these grounds and several witnesses were examined, the case for the crown closing last evening, and defense witnesses who included the prisoner himself and the manager of the Cosmar farm were heard today. The small size youth and boyish actions of Gibson, who is only about fifteen years of age, seemed to make his case a puzzle to the spectators in court.

Before separating after submitting their finding yesterday morning, the grand jury rose and through their foreman, Arthur W. Carpenter, read to Judge Crockett, who on this occasion was holding his first circuit in Queens county, the following address:

To His Honor Mr. Justice Crockett: "We, the members of the Grand Inquest of the County of Queens have great pleasure on this, the occasion of your first visit in your official capacity to Queens County, in cordially congratulating Your Honor on your promotion to the high judicial position now occupied by you."

"After a busy career at the Bar and somewhat strenuous career in political life, we feel sure that Your Honor welcomes the judicial atmosphere of the Bench; and we believe that if integrity of purpose, industry and high intellectual attainments are a guarantee of success in a judicial position—all of which Your Honor possesses in a marked degree—that your career on the Bench will be as distinguished as it has been at the Bar and in public life."

"This high honor coming to you at a comparatively early age, we feel sure that many years of usefulness to our country lie ahead of you; and it is our earnest hope that you may be long spared to adorn the position which you so worthily occupy."

London, May 20.—The four hundredth year of the foundation of Trinity House, the world famous corporation of master mariners, chartered on May 29, 1514, by Henry VIII, was celebrated today.

At the time of its chartering the organization was described as "the guild of fraternity of the most glorious and undividable trinity of St. Clement, its founder was Sir Thomas Spert, commander of the famous battleship Harry Grace Le Dieu and controller of the navy."

At first it was mainly concerned with supplying pilots for the ships entering and leaving Deptford royal dockyard, but Henry VIII. increased its prestige by handing over to it the corporation, the direction of that dockyard.

Queen Elizabeth entrusted the corporation with what constitutes its chief modern duty by handing over to it authority to erect beacons and other marks for the guidance of navigators around the English coasts. These duties connected with pilotage, erection and maintenance of lighthouses, buoys and beacons have been carried out by Trinity House ever since, and it has always led the world in the matter of coast lighting.
