In yesterday's casualty list the name of A. M. Magee appeared as "presumed to have died."

This laconic announcement by no means solves the mystery of the fate of a St. John soldier, son of John B. Magee of Mecklenburg street.

A. M. Magee was employed in the Royal Bank of, Canada and was transferred from the North End branch to Calgary. At the opening of bostillities he enlisted with the 10th Battalion. After a short time spent in Valcartier, the battalion left for overseas and spent that winter on Salisbury Plains. Early in the year 1915 young Magee left for Belgium with his comrades where he gave a good account of himself.

In the second battle of Ypres when the Canadians made such a splendid name for themselves Magee was wounded and sent to the 2nd Battalion dressing station and from there to No. 5 casualty clearing station.
