2. As soon as rut, hollow or depression holding water begins to form, they should be filled in at once, using some material as that of which the road is made...

3. A road should be so shaped that the water falling upon it will quickly drain into the side ditches, instead of remaining upon the surface...

4. The crown should be maintained by cutting off the shoulders and spreading new material evenly on the centre of the road. Don't put sods and mud from the ditches...

5. Side ditches should be so graded as to convey the water freely and quickly into the nearest natural water course, but not too deep, will fill the ruts, keep the surface smooth and preserve the crown...

6. All ditches and culverts should be kept constantly open and clear of obstruction. The heaviest downfalls of rain often occur in dry weather when least expected...
