

Several German supporting points on the Somme front were captured last night by the French, says today's communication from the war office. The announcement follows:

"North of the Somme notwithstanding the persistent bad weather, we followed up during the night the advantages gained by us between Lesbonefs and Saillie-Saillisel.

"Our troops consolidated the ground won, carried sevent points of support, and cleared out eral machine gun emplacements.

"During these operations we took 186 prisoners, including eight officers. This brings up to 586 the number of prisoners taken by us yesterday in this sector.

"On the right bank of the Meuse (Verdun front) the night was relatively calm.
