(To the Associated Press.) New York, Sept. 14—p. m. Late advices from Lima report the attempted assassination of President of Peru. Several shots were fired at him, and several arrests have been made.

The Schleswig-Holstein question is assuming a serious aspect in consequence of the daily explosion of the German press. Public opinion will compel the Government to send a formal protest to Berlin, and ultimately to retaliate by the expulsion of German subjects from Danish soil.

Partial returns from the election for a member of the French Assembly in the department of Maine-et-Loire indicate a Republican plurality, but no choice.

(Special to Daily News.) OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—In the North Renfrew Election Trial (Conservative), is unseated for undue influence exercised by one of his agents.

OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—In the North Renfrew election case the Grits persist in expressing their charges of personal bribery against White, in order to disqualify him. After exhausting the witnesses the counsel for the Petitioner admitted that the charge was groundless in closing, and the Judge complimented White on the complete and satisfactory way in which he cleared himself from the charge of personal bribery, and for his efforts to have the election conducted honestly.

REPORTED MUTINY IN SPAIN. It is reported from Spain that the Republican troops had mutinied against Gen. Laserna, the newly appointed commander-in-chief of the Army of the North, and cheered for Gen. Moriones, whose restoration they demanded. Another report says that Gen. Laserna is concentrating his troops at Miranda, and expects to begin operations next week. This report makes no mention of a mutiny.

BRASIL'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS. The trial of the alleged accomplices of Basilio's escape began at Grasse yesterday.

BRASIL'S INDEPENDENCE DAY. The celebration on the 14th inst. at Rio Janeiro of the anniversary of Brazil's independence was very brilliant.

THE WHITE LEAGUE. A New Orleans mass-meeting in the interests of the White League yesterday passed resolutions demanding the abolition of Gov. Kellogg, with which the Governor refused to comply. Thereupon the citizens were instructed to arm themselves and be subject to the directions of the League.

CIVIL WAR IN LOUISIANA. Lieut. Governor Pennington issued a proclamation, calling on the militia of the State, and the citizens assembled in arms in the streets, where, being met by Kellogg's troops, a fight ensued, resulting in about 50 killed and many wounded, and the citizens were put to flight. They have possession of the City Hall, however, but at last accounts no further bloodshed was imminent.

FREEMAN'S ELECTION. The election in Maine resulted in the re-election of Gov. Dingley by an increased majority, the election of all Republican Legislators, and the return of a Republican Legislature. The vote was in excess of last year's.

Little Wanders. Some genuine little wanders, and big ones too, are on the way from St. Andrews here. A letter from there states that a man named McDowell, his wife and children, including one crippled boy, left South Bay early this spring, and went to St. Andrews. There they opened a house that at once became a resort of the worst characters in town, and the authorities were obliged to break it up.

Two of the daughters were not at the house, and were found on an island in the bay, under the protection of young men belonging to a schooner. When the girls were arrested the youngest was explained to go to her mother, and was allowed to do so. The elder was put in goal, and, as she desires it, is to be sent to this city. It was ascertained that she had been in Calais, in several respectable families in Calais, and that some clothes belonging to her were found. Both girls stated that their parents forced them to lead respectable lives for money to supply them with rum.

After the escape of McDowell and his wife left town in the night, and were last seen directing their steps towards this city, accompanied by the crippled boy and the other children. The girl will arrive in this city by the Edgar Sturton on Friday, and the Chief of Police will endeavor to secure her a place at the Home, where she may be kept for a life of vice and misery.
