Students of the Sophomore Year must take the fixed subjects in Departments II., IV., VI. and VII.; also the Pass work in Latin, and in any two of the following:—Greek, French, German and Hebrew.

Honor Students are exempt from one of the above optional languages, and, if they take Honors in more than one Department, are further exempted from Logic or Mineralogy.
