INDIANS DENY 'HOLE IN CORNER'

Say Dr. D. C. Scott Has Not Attempted to Force Settlement of Title

Tribes of the Allied Indian Tribes of B. C., held in the Central mission yesterday, a statement officially denying allegations by officials of the Society of Friends of the Indians of British Columbia that Dr. Duncan Campbell Scott. deputy minister of the interior, had held "hole in the corner meetings in an attempt to force down the throats of the Indians a settlement which was opposed to the principles of righteousness and justice," was issued to The Sun.

Andrew Paull, secretary of the Allied Tribes, declared that Dr. Scott had met the chiefs and members of the Squamish Indian tribes, but that he had not discussed any matters whatever pertaining to the Allied Indian tribes. He pointed out that when Hen. Charles Stewart had promised to confer with Indians for a final settlement the Indians had let the matter rest without further discussion with any member of the department of the interior.
